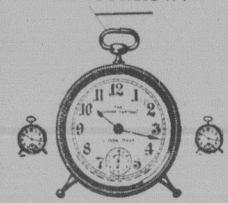

### TELLS HIS STORY.

#### McGillivuddy Gets Indifferent Hearing in Centre York.

Toronto, Aug. 29.—Dan McGillivuddy had his turn at a meeting of Centre York electors at Humber Bay last night. He was there to tell the people about his charges against Hon. Frank Oliver, the substance of which has already been published.

About 300 men and women were crowded into Devin's Hall. Mr. McGillivuddy was interrupted time and time again. Dr. Forbes Godfrey, M.P.P., pleaded and threatened. Finally his appeal to give one more chance took the wrong course and a score of men made a rush at the main entrance, and to the accompaniment of cries, "Put him in the Humber," he made a speedy but in-famous exit.

Mr. McGillivuddy's speech was virtually a condemnation of a letter addressed to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, under date of July 8 last. During the course of his remarks Mr. McGillivuddy made no attempt to state where the money "Thompson Brigades" had come from, but he stated that in 1907 a "slush fund" for the Liberal party was raised in New York, and the member of the Government who went down to deal with the fund was Hon. Frank Oliver.

Mr. McGillivuddy disclaimed any desire for reward. His answer to Sir Wilfrid's question, "What do you want?" was that Frank Oliver should retire from the Cabinet and give way to a man who retained the confidence of the people, suggesting Dr. Michael Clark, Red Deer, Alta., as a fitting person. That letter hastened dissolution, he declared, because Sir Wilfrid, when in trouble, was always disposed to leave the matter in the hands of the party and the country.

New York, Aug. 29.—Standing on the corner of New and Beaver streets yesterday, Arthur Veit, connected with the Standard Oil Co., where his father, Richard C., is one of the managers, committed suicide by shooting himself through the head.

Young Veit was employed in the shipping department of the company.

The young man, without a word, left his work and went to the street, where he pulled a revolver from his pocket and fired a shot through his head.

The police found many letters and papers in his pockets, and through these his identity was established.

Sunday Cars Popular.

Kingston, Aug. 29.—Kingston's Sunday car service will be discontinued after next Sunday. The company agreed to run July and August, but decided to give another day's service. The cars have been well patronized, the receipts being larger per hour than any other day. Sunday night's cars were tied up for over an hour for an unusual reason. The driver at the power-house was taken suddenly ill, and before a man could be secured to take his place the steam gave out and the power fell off.

Motorists' Close Call.

St. Catharines, Aug. 29.—Mrs. F. N. Hara, Robert Fuller, of the Imperial Bank, Miss Bailey of this city, and Mrs. Hara's son, nearly met death in an automobile accident Sunday night.

They were returning home by the Lake Shore road, Mrs. Hara driving, when she lost her head and the car rolled back over a ten-foot embankment. Fortunately the car was caught by a tree and though all the occupants were thrown out, none were hurt.

Sarah Was Captured.

Ottawa, Aug. 29.—The gasoline schooner Sarah, of Seattle, was taken into New Westminster, B.C., harbor yesterday morning in charge of a Canadian fishery protective cruiser. The Sarah was taken by the Government cruiser while it is alleged, she was fishing within the three-mile limit. The capture was reported by wire to the Department of Marine and Fisheries.

Found Dead in Well.

Hamilton, Aug. 29.—Between 4 and 6 o'clock yesterday evening a man named Bunt, who resided at Kenilworth, was found dead in a well in the rear of his house, and it is supposed that he was overcome with a dizzy fit to which he was subject, and fell in head first.

Minister Killed at Crossing.

Niagara Falls, Ont., Aug. 29.—Geo. Goodwin, aged 84, was struck by a Michigan Central passenger train at Bender avenue crossing yesterday and instantly killed. He was carried along for some distance and badly cut and mangled. His one-year-old grandson was thrown out of the buggy, but escaped serious injury. Goodwin was a superannuated Presbyterian minister.

Killed Whole Family.

South Thompson, Me., Aug. 29.—Grief over the death of his wife led Edward Bennett, a graduate of Oxford University, England, who had been a resident of this town for the past six years, to murder his three children and then take his own life yesterday. Two of the children were killed by the use of chloroform and the third by cyanide of potassium and chloroform.

### HE DESERVES A MEDAL.

BOLD THIEF WHO HAD COURAGE ENOUGH TO CARRY AWAY A BEEHIVE.

The crime of theft ought to be excused and a medal for bravery pinned to the breast of the thief, who Sunday night stole a beehive, with its full quota of inhabitants from the apiary of Mr. Thos. Elliott, Carnegie street. Yesterday morning there were thousands of indignant bees holding a council of war a block or so from Mr. Elliott's premises. A policeman, who was summoned to view the ruins of the once happy and prosperous family of honey-makers, was singled out for an attack, and for once he was "stung."

The hive, after being carried a safe distance from Mr. Elliott's place, was broken open and a quantity of honey, which Mr. Elliott values at \$8 or \$10, taken.

The police are working on the case and hope to make an arrest shortly.

## PACT ENDORSED BY CONSERVATIVE

F. W. Sypher Makes a Strong Address in Favor of Reciprocity at Meeting at Brownsville in Interests of M. S. Schell.

A rousing meeting in the interests of Mr. M. S. Schell, the Liberal candidate, was held at Brownsville last night. This was the opening meeting of the campaign conducted by the Liberals and it is any indication of the interest taken in the great question now before the people, there is a strong desire on the part of the electorate to know what the reciprocity agreement really means and what its effect is likely to be upon the trade of this country.

The large hall was filled to the doors and every speaker was given an attentive hearing. No opposition speaker appeared for Mr. Sutherland, but the time was fully occupied by the Liberals in explaining the agreement and criticizing some of the so-called arguments of those who opposed reciprocity.

CONSERVATIVE G.O. PLATFORM

An interesting feature, and one being quite common in this campaign, was that Mr. F. W. Sypher, a Conservative, appeared on the platform and made a splendid argument for reciprocity. He stated he had always been a Conservative but in this campaign, he was thinking for himself, and intended to vote for what he believed to be the interests of the country. He believed the Conservative party had made a mistake in opposing reciprocity and he could not follow them. He showed clearly by figures that he had taken the pains to look into the terms of the agreement and was justified in taking the position he did.

The other speakers were T. R. Mayberry, M.L.A., Dr. Rogers and Mr. Schell.

One who has attended many meetings of this kind at Brownsville stated that it was the most largely attended and attentive meeting he had ever attended there.

A young man was heard to remark after the meeting "there was some class to that meeting."

## HAD TO LOOK FOR AN ABSENTEE

Before Meeting of Board of Education Could be Commenced—Only Six Members Present at 8.30—A Short Session.

Members of the Board of Education were scarce last night and as a result it was 8.45 when the proceedings were formally commenced. At 9 o'clock, the appointed time for opening the meeting, there were only six members present, including Chairman Macaulay. Seven members constitute a quorum, and after waiting until 9.30 it was decided to call the meeting off as the attendance had not been increased. There were a number of accounts which the Board was desirous of passing, and after the members had reached the street there was a reconsideration of the situation and one of the members set out to hunt up an absentee. In the course of a few minutes he returned, accompanied by Mr. John Lenihan and the members retraced their steps to the council chamber and at 8.45 the meeting was opened.

TEACHERS' COMMITTEE.

The Teachers' Committee reported that the appointment of Mrs. Hull to room No. 2 North in place of Miss Gibbs had been made. The report was adopted.

A motion carried authorizing Principal Briden of the Collegiate Institute to use certain text books during 1911-12.

There was a slight discussion in regard to the extra \$25 to be paid each of the caretakers of the schools for their services in connection with the playgrounds movement. Trustee Ackert was of the opinion that the money was being thrown away. In the course of the remarks it was stated that the attendance at the grounds had been very small after the first couple of weeks.

Trustee Morrey said it would be necessary to pay the caretakers the extra money this year but the experience should teach the Board a lesson for another year.

The Chairman said he liked to see the children play, but the Board was not getting value for their money in this respect.

An adjournment was made at 9 o'clock.
