THE GAUNTLET'S DOWN

Great Britain Will Fight for Her Rights in China.

ANNOUNCEMENT RECEIVED WITH CH. 25 P. THE BRITISH HOUSE OF COMMONS—FLEET AT GIBRALTAR INSTRUCTED TO WAIT THERE FOR ORDERS.

London, August 12.—In the House of Commons yesterday, A. J. Balfour, Government leader, admitted that the facts set forth in the Pekin despatch to the London Times to-day were substantially as therein set forth. The correspondent of the Times cabled that the Tseung-Li-Yamen had given formal consent to all the conditions demanded by the Russian Charge d'Affaires, M. Pabloff, regarding the contract for the Niu-Chang Railroad extension loan, these conditions being in direct conflict with the terms of the signed contract, and designed to block the final completion of the contract, the whole movement being designed as a blow to British concessions. After making the admission referred to, Mr. Balfour added that the matter was engaging the serious attention of the Government, who would see that British rights were preserved at any cost. This statement was received with cheers.

BOYS IN TROUBLE.

They Admit Doing Some Pilfering and Have Been Remanded for Sentence.

THEIR OFFICERS.

Business Transacted by the I. O. O. F. Grand Lodge at Galt.

Dues and Benefit Question—Several Appeals Dealt With—Reports.

Galt, Ont., Aug. 12.—The report of the Committee on Election Returns was the first report received yesterday morning. It showed that no election resulted in the subordinate lodges for Grand Warden, and the election of that officer was proceeded with, thirteen candidates being in the field. Five retired, and on the third ballot Bro. O. L. Lewis, of Chatham, carried off the title. The other officers for the ensuing year are:

J. E. Farewell, Whiteby, Grand Master; James McClung, Woodstock, Deputy Grand Master; O. L. Lewis, Chatham, Grand Warden; J. R. King, Toronto, Grand Secretary; W. J. McCormack, Toronto, Grand Treasurer; Henry White, P. G. M., Grand Representative; Charles Packert, Grand Auditor.

Henry White, P. G. M., Director of the Oddfellows' Home for three years. The Mileage and Per Diem Committee's adopted report fixes the rate of mileage at 5 cents a mile each way, and \$2 per diem.

The special committee's report on dues and benefits received yesterday afternoon, contained one of the most important matters to come before the Grand Lodge, namely, a uniformity of dues and benefits throughout the jurisdiction. The report was adopted, but a change was made in the clause relating to the amount of dues and benefits to be paid, it being left permissible with the subordinate lodges to increase their dues and benefits, but they must be governed by the actuary's table.

Appeals were then considered. Those of Ottawa Lodge against the decision of the lodge, W. A. Knight v. Tecumseh Lodge, and Haywood v. same lodge, John Johns v. Ottawa Lodge, W. H. Shaw v. L. L. Lodge, Jas. T. John, Ottawa, v. D. D. G. M. Abbott, were thrown out, and that of Minto Lodge v. Harriston District, was sustained.

The finance committee's report was also adopted, and the litigation cases of Forest City and Dominion lodges, of London, the Grand Lodge agreed to pay one-half the costs and counsel fees. In the case of Nith Lodge the Grand Lodge will pay the balance of the costs. The meeting will conclude to-night.
