

It will be about two miles in length and its construction, includ ing the right of way, which has already been secured, will cost about \$10,000. Each passenger will furnish his own motive power, and can whizz along at the rate of a milo in three minutes or go as much slower as he wishes. There will be two tracks, one for north and


