For the Use of the Ducal Party on the C. P. R.

(Montreal Gazette.)

A real novelty the telephone line has just completed by the Canadian Pacific railway for the benefit of the royal party on its overland trip to the coast. It consits briefly of an inter-connecting system of telephones through a superb train of eight cars, so that communication from any part of the train may easily be got. Each car has its own instrument, and great ingenuity has been displayed to overcome the vibration of the cars in motion.

The instruments, which were manufactured by the Northern Electric Manufacturing company of this city, were installed by the Bell Telephone company. They are of special design, in which the receiver and transmitter are combined. Between the cars fexible cables are used, which fit into a sort of socket. It is understood a similar system was placed at the disposal of the royal party in Australia, but not so parfect as the one devised here. An attempt has been made here before to put in single telephones, but this is the first instance of the use of a telephone system. Four conversations may be carried on at the same lime, and it is just possible that the plan may be adopted by the big railways for the convenience of their passentgers.
