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VIOLATED THEIR OATHS.

Ten Burglers Who Are on Trial at Fredericton.

Ten burghers, charged with violation of their oath of neutrality, were tried by court-martial at Fredericton, on Tuesday, by Mr. De Wilde, of the Netherlands Relief Committee, paid, Schogap, a spy who is now a witness for the prosecution, \$10 on the recommendation of the Netherlands Relief Committee.
