WINTER PORT IS ALL READY.

St. John Prepared to Handle Season's Business.

Steamship and Immigration Officials Arrive—First Steamer Arrives Tomorrow.

The winter port business can now be said to be fairly opened. While as yet no steamers have reached this port, the C. P. R. arrived yesterday after Monday will arrive almost daily.

W. A. Wainwright, who will again be St. John manager for the Allan Steamship Co., arrived in the city yesterday. Mr. Wainwright is not sure yet whether the passengers destined for the Northwest will be brought to St. John and sent west by the C. P. R. or forwarded from Halifax.

A. H. Davis, Atlantic steamship clerk of the C. P. R., arrived yesterday from Quebec. Mr. Davis has many friends here and all gave him a hearty welcome. Mr. Davis and wife are stopping at the Clifton House.

Thodore Bernard, better known as "John the Greek," C. P. R. interpreter, arrived this morning from Quebec. John was given a hearty reception.

Col. Thomas, chief of the immigration staff, is expected here next week. The colonel has been visiting his old home in Ohio, and spent some time there previous to the presidential election. Major Conklin, the colonel's chief of staff, arrived today, as did Wm. Magee.

Another who arrived today was W. J. McGiffin, marine superintendent for the C. P. R. This is Mr. McGiffin's first season here.

The Allan liner Ionian left Halifax at six o'clock last night and will dock here Sunday morning. She has a big cargo, including ten cars of fruit and about fifty cars of general merchandise for the west.

The C. P. R. steamer Montrose will probably reach here Monday and a Manchester line boat on Tuesday.

The first crowd of immigrants to pass through the city this fall arrived today on a special train, about 11.30 o'clock. There were about a hundred and seventy-five of them and they consisted mainly of Englishmen and Russian Jews. The train stopped over for about an hour and then moved west.

The immigrants are bound for points in North Ontario, Manitoba and British Columbia. Among them were a party of weavers, who are to locate at Almont, Ontario. The majority of the immigrants seemed to be well dressed in point of cash.

The Allan liner Ionian, by which the immigrants came to this country, brought in all 473 steerage passengers, a small fraction of whom remained on the steamer and will land at this port. The train that arrived this morning was preceded by two others which went west by the I. C. R.

THE PRICE OF SUGAR.

Another Rise Last Night—A History of the Increases.

Since the first of the month, raw sugar has advanced on the London market from 108, to 148, 61 per hundred weight. Refined sugar has advanced as follows:

Nov. 1st, 10 cents per 100 lbs. Nov. 2nd, 10 cents per 100 lbs. Nov. 12, 5 cents per 100 lbs. Nov. 12, 10 cents per 100 lbs. Nov. 14, 10 cents per 100 lbs. Nov. 18, 10 cents per 100 lbs.

The retail price in sugar has changed from 20 lbs. on Oct. 30th to 18 lbs. for \$1 on Nov. 1st and to 16 lbs. for \$1 at present. From Sept. 1st to Nov. 1st sugar was steady.

Last evening raw sugar went up one-sixteenth of a cent.
