JUJNCIL DECIDES TO

Sand Point Dredging Will be Resumed at Once----Mayor Suggested That the Site at the Corner of Leinster and Carmarthen Streets Would be Suitable For Drill Hall---Supt. Downie Made Application For Use of Land at Bay Shore.

Mr. Hyman that the city will indemnify the government or contractor for damages resulting from the extension of the dredging operations towards
Union street.

Mr. Downie, divisional superintendent of the C. P. R., appeared before the general committee of the council and placed before that body the requests of the company in regard to their future plans.

The mayor brought up the question of the suitability of the city property at the corner of Carmarthen and Leinster streets for the purpose of a drill hall. The suggestion was well received and a committee appointed.

"Upon his worship receiving from Mr. Mayes an undertaking such as the council may advise."

Supt. Wm. Downie was then heard. He made an application for the use of certain lands at Bay Shore for the purpose of providing more adequate yarding facilities, as mentioned previously in this paper. The company propose to build a retaining wall and lay tracks for next winter's use. The work can be completed within two months.

The general committee recommended that a committee be appointed to look into the matter.

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Mayor Sears said that yesterday he had received a telegram from the Hon. Mr. Hyman, in which the minister of public works said that both the government and the contractor must have a guarantee for damages before the work can be continued, to which his worship had replied that the matter would be put before this meeting. Personally, he said he felt it would be much better to deal with the government and not with the C. P. R., with whom the city has no contract.

The mayor said that it might be as well to appoint a committee to go to Ottawa with power to act. The city could deal more directly with the government by this method than through also look into the matter of the drill shed.

Recorder Skinner said that there might be some trouble about a form for guaranteeing the government.

Ald. Baxter said he did not think there was any need of a formal guarantee. A simple telegram to the minister stating that we felt a moral obligation would be sufficient.

The council then dissolved into general committee to discuss the matter privately.

Ald. Lockhart moved the following resolution, which was seconded by Ald. Bullock:

"Resolved, That his worship the mayor be authorized to send to the minister of public works a telegram in the following terms:

A committee was appointed of the mayor, Ald. Sproul, Tilley, Pickett, Lantalum, Lockhart, to look into this. Recorder Skinner reported in regard to the building at the corner of North and George streets, which is in a dangerous condition. If we tear down the building, the city will have to pay the expenses of the tearing down, as the nave it built there. He understood that the government had said that if the armory is to be put up in any other place than the Barrack Green that the city would have to provide the site. This he did not think right any more than that the department should ask the city to provide rifles.
