RAPID GROWTH OF ST. JOHN'S SHIPPING

An Interesting Review of the Past Few Years

An Increase of Twenty Millions in Exports Since 1898—The Remarkable Expansion of Traffic.

The growth of shipping at the port of St. John makes an interesting study for the citizen who is in search of an argument to show that this city is going ahead. In the winter of 1897-98 there were four trans-Atlantic steamship lines running from this port and only a few years before that time there were no lines from here. Steamers in 1897-98 carried freight to and from Liverpool, London, Glasgow, and Belfast and Dublin. In 1898-99 the Manchester service was started, and a year and 1899-00 the Allan's inaugurated the London and Havre line, which is likely to show a marked increase in the business between this country and France in the future, in consequence of the new French treaty.

With the registered tonnage of the steamers coming here in 1897-98 was 102,316, as compared with 474,620, the figures for last season, and the value of the cargoes has advanced from \$4,848,768 to \$24,564,540 in that time. Thus there was an increase of nearly twenty millions of dollars in twelve years.

In addition to the trans-Atlantic business, the South African service has been successfully carried on since 1893. Last year the exports to South Africa amounted to \$1,155,794, as compared with \$665,538 in 1902-03. There has also been the regular service to the West Indies, and during the past few years a very profitable trade has been developed with Cuba. The coastwise service has been greatly improved in the last few years as well by small steamers, and regular steamer trips from this port to the south shore of Nova Scotia have had the effect of increasing trade to points in that district.

Next season it is altogether probable that a line of steamers will be running from this port to Australia, carrying away Canadian products and bringing back large cargoes of mutton for which the port is well known. Negotiations are also under way for inaugurating a steamship service between Canada and Austria with Montreal as the summer port, and St. John as the winter terminal. It is probable, too, that the new steamship line to Italy will next winter make St. John its Canadian port.

With the present season's business showing a big increase over last year, there is every reason to feel satisfied with the rate at which St. John is going ahead in this regard.

ABSOLUTE DIVORCE FOR WM. J. LEMMON

Wife's Maine Divorce Not Recognized and Subsequent Marriage Furnished Grounds—Wright vs. Wright Postponed.

His Honor Mr. Justice McKeown opened the divorce court at noon today in Chambers here.

On application of the plaintiff in the case of Wright vs. Wright the case goes over until next Saturday at eleven o'clock. Mr. John A. Sinclair appears for the plaintiff and Mr. J. J. Porter for the respondent.

His honor delivered judgment in the case of Lemmon vs. Lemmon, granting the plaintiff an absolute divorce. The plaintiff, William James Lemmon of this city, and the respondent, Lillian Madeline, his wife, were married here on April 16th, 1885, by the Rev. Henry Penna, pastor of the Portland Methodist Church. They lived together until August, 1905. Three children were born. On account of frequent quarrels the couple parted, and Mrs. Lemmon went to Maine, where she obtained a divorce from her husband. She then returned to this province and went through a form of marriage with one Wilson, and both reside on City Road. One child was born to them.

The divorce obtained by the woman in Maine is not recognized by the state of this province, as the court of Maine had not jurisdiction over Lemmon, he being domiciled in New Brunswick. Accordingly, Mr. Lemmon sued his wife for a divorce, a vinculo matrimonii, and the case was tried before his honor at Fredericton on February 22nd last. The wife's adultery was proven by a person who attended her at the birth of her last child and his honor therefore granted the divorce.

Mr. I. P. D. Tilley appeared for the respondent. The respondent did not appear.
