A meeting at which representatives of the Town Council, all the churches, lodges and charitable organizations in the Town were present, was held in the Court House on Monday evening, for the purpose of organizing a United Charities Association for the centralizing of relief work in the Town during the coming winter.

Mayor Cormier was chairman and outlined the situation with reference to unemployment and destitution and the purpose of the meeting. Remarks were made by Hon. J. F. Michaud, D.R. Bishop, Gaspard Boucher, Pius Michaud, C. M. Rideout, Reid Richards, Dr. A. M. Sormany and others. It was moved by Mr. Bishop and seconded by Mr. Rideout that the United Charities Association be organized.
