THE OLD POLICY, THE OLD FLAG AND THE OLD EMPIRE

SENATOR SIR GEO. W. ROSS—For many years Minister of Education in the Morat and Hardy Governments. Premier of Ontario from 1899 to 1905. Leader of the Liberal party in the Legislature until 1907, when Sir Wilfrid Laurier advised his elevation to the Senate. Author of a Life of Alexander Mackenzie. President of the Manufacturers' Life Insurance Company. An exceedingly strong Liberal, but ever conspicuous for his affection for the Empire and for British connection. Denounced reciprocity in advance.

HON. CLIFFORD SUTTON—Minister of the Interior from 1896 to 1905 rather than sanction the Autonomy Acts. Appointed as member of the Manitoba Government under Mr. Greenway from 1891 to 1896. Served as British Agent before the Alaska Boundary Tribunal. Described prior to 1905 as one of the "Big Four" of the Laurier Government. Left office in 1905 rather than sanction the Autonomy Acts. Appointed Chairman of the Canadian Conservation Commission in 1909 and has displayed great energy and industry in applying himself to the investigations demanded by that post.

LLOYD HARRIS—A wealthy manufacturer and large employer of men in Brantford. Captured Brantford from the Conservatives in 1908. Had an excellent standing in the House of Commons and was influential in Liberal party. Despite his refusal to support the Government on reciprocity the Liberal convention of Brantford begged him to take the nomination on his own terms. He refused, and will vote against reciprocity. Has stated that 90 per cent. of the Liberal members would have voted against reciprocity if it had been submitted to caucus.

W. M. GERMAN, M.P.—A faithful Liberal. Elected first to House of Commons in 1891. Known as a keen politician. Revolted on subject of reciprocity on the ground that the interests of his constituency demanded such a course. The Government and machine Liberals made repeated efforts to deprive him of the nomination and to set up a pro-reciprocity Liberal in his place, but failed, and he is the one man in Ontario to-day entitled to write M.P. after his name, having received the only acclamation of the election.

HON. D. O. CAMERON—Lieut. Governor of Manitoba. A wealthy lumberman. Formerly Liberal member of the Ontario Legislature. Liberal candidate for Winnipeg in 1908. Very recently given his present appointment by the Laurier Government.

SIR EDMUND WALKER, TORONTO—President and for many years general manager of the Canadian Bank of Commerce. Universally acknowledged as one of the very highest authorities in Canada on banking and finance. A member of one of the most influential financial groups in the country. Always hitherto a Liberal, and on close and friendly terms with the Laurier Government.

JOHN L. BLAISE, TORONTO—President of the Canada Landed and National Investment. A Liberal of many years' standing.

W. D. MATTHEWS, TORONTO—Head of the firm of W. D. Matthews & Co., grain merchants; a director of the C. P. R.; vice-president of the Dominion Bank. Formerly president of the Toronto Board of Trade. Always a Liberal.

W. K. GEORGE, TORONTO—President of the Standard Silver Company. A man of wide public activities.

E. A. LASH, K.C.—Member of the firm of Blake, Lash, Anglin & Cassels. Chief solicitor of the Canadian Northern Railway. A life-long Liberal.

W. T. WHITE—Vice-president National Trust Company.

G. T. SOMERS—President Sterling Bank and Canada Grain Company, Limited.

E. S. GOURLAY, TORONTO—President of the Board of Trade.

SIR WILLIAM MORTIMER CLARK, K.C., TORONTO—President Toronto Mortgage Company. Director Metropolitan Bank. Appointed by Laurier Government Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, which office he held from 1903 to 1908.

E. J. CHRISTIE, TORONTO—Head of Christie, Brown & Co., biscuit manufacturers.

HUGH BLAIN, TORONTO—Vice-president of the Eby-Blain wholesale grocery firm. Has been Liberal candidate in Toronto.

H. S. STRATHY, TORONTO—Former general manager of the Traders Bank.

I. GOLDMAN, TORONTO—Managing director of the North American Life Assurance Company.

G. A. SOMERVILLE, TORONTO—Manager of the Manufacturers' Life Insurance Company.

W. FRANCOIS, TORONTO—Senior partner of the legal firm of Francis & Wardrop.

JAMES D. ALLAN, TORONTO—Vice-president of the firm of A. A. Allen & Co. Formerly president of the Toronto Board of Trade.

E. R. WOOD, TORONTO—Vice-president and general manager of the Central Canada Loan and Savings Company; general manager of the Dominion Securities Corporation; vice-president National Trust Company; director in numerous enterprises including the Canadian Bank of Commerce and the Canada Life Assurance Company.

JOHN R. BOOTH, OTTAWA—Millionaire lumberman and employer of labor on a very large scale. Has been on close and friendly terms with the Laurier Government since 1896.

J. N. GREENSHIELDS, K.C., MONTREAL—Lawyer and financier, closely associated with Laurier Government and Liberal party for years.

PAUL GALIBERT, MONTREAL—Owner of one of the largest tanneries in the Province of Quebec, director of numerous commercial enterprises. Director of La Presse, Sir Wilfrid Laurier's special journalistic mouthpiece.

DAVID McCLAREN, OTTAWA—Head of one of the pioneer lumbering firms of the Ottawa Valley. President of the Bank of Ottawa.

R. M. BALLANTYNE, MONTREAL—Of the firm of Messrs. Lovell & Christmas, one of the largest exporters of butter and cheese in the world; a director of the Lake of the Woods Milling Company, and heavily interested in some of the most important industries of the country; son of Hon. Thos. Ballantyne, at one time Liberal Speaker of the Ontario Legislature.

D. REED, M.P.P., GLANFORD—Member for Wentworth in Ontario Legislature. Admitted that if it had been possible he would have gone with deputation of fruit and vegetable growers which protested against reciprocity.

DR. T. B. RICHARDSON, TORONTO—Wrote to North Toronto Liberal Association declaring he could not support the agreement.

MATTHEW KENNEDY, OWEN SOUND—Head of the firm of Kennedy & Son. Formerly a Liberal candidate, he has been active on anti-reciprocity side.

H. W. H. KNOTT, WINNIPEG—A former president of the Winnipeg Liberal Association, who has seceded on the issue.

DR. T. F. CHAMBERLAIN, MORRISBURG—A very stalwart Liberal, who once contested Dundas in the Federal election in the Liberal interest.

JOHN DICK, COBOURG—Head of John Dick, Limited, manufacturers of tweeds and worsteds, life-long Reformer, who has worked not only at Cobourg, but also at Toronto, Seaford and Streetsville, has written to Mr. C. A. Manson, Conservative candidate in West Northumberland, declaring he will break with the Liberal party on the issue of reciprocity.

LIEUT. COL. W. M. GARTHSORE, LONDON—Vice-president and general manager of the McClary Manufacturing Company, an old Liberal who has voted Liberal in previous elections, will not vote for reciprocity.

JOHN RANSFORD, WINGHAM—The head of the suit industry in his part of the country. Supported Laurier in 1908. Says reciprocity would close his works in Clinton and Goderich, with a wage list of \$15,000 a year.

F. CHATTAN STEPHENS, MONTREAL—Son of the late Hon. George W. Stephens, a very prominent Liberal.

EDMUND CONWAY, QUEBEC—A well-known contractor and wood merchant of that city, and a life-long Liberal, has declared himself against reciprocity.

JAMES JARDINE, HESPELER—Managing partner of A. B. Jardine & Company, Hespeler, well known throughout Canada as makers of taps, dies and blacksmiths', machinists', and boiler-makers' tools, etc.; has been a Liberal in politics all his life; never cast other than a Liberal vote.

ARCHIBALD MCGOON, MONTREAL—A very well known lawyer, prominent and highly respected in the municipal life of Westmount. Liberal all his life.

GILBERT JOHNSTON, MONTREAL—Mechanical superintendent R. & O. Navigation Company; a life-long Liberal.

W. L. EDMONDS, TORONTO—Ran as a Liberal candidate several years ago in East Toronto. Is against Reciprocity and will cast his first vote against his party because of that issue.

A. G. COLE, OTTAWA—President of the National Manufacturing Company, who says: "I was born a Liberal; and I am a Liberal still; but I have to break with my party on the Reciprocity issue."

J. K. CARROLL, KINGSTON—Who has always voted Liberal, but who will not stand for reciprocity.

G. M. MURRAY, TORONTO, Member of the Technical Education Commission.

J. H. ADAMS, TORONTO—Four years alderman for Ward Six. Signed Mr. A. C. Macdonell's nomination papers.
