

Montreal, Sept. 15.—Bad teeth may cause paralysis, and cases of appendicitis have been traced to the use of public drinking cups, so Dr. Weston A. Price, head of the research department of the National Dental Association of the United States, Cleveland, Ohio, stated today at the convention of the Canadian Dental Association in this city, in a paper on "The relation of mouth infection to systemic diseases." A connection between infection of the teeth and cancer was established by Dr. Price in a slide shown to the delegates.
