GOVERNMENT EXPECTS TO CARRY CARLETON BY 400

Opposition Machine Attempting to Save Jones of Old Disgraced Regime at Fredericton at Expense of Upham and McCain—"Frank Smith and Good Roads" Winning Slogan in St. John Valley.

Hartland, Feb. 16.—The campaign in this section of the county is now getting in full swing and the prospects for the Government candidates never looked better. A Government meeting will be held in the Lyric Hall here on Friday evening, and will be sure to draw a large crowd.

A feature of the campaign is the fact that at this season of the year a large number of men are in the lumber woods, and these men come from the sections where the Government get their largest majorities. Many, however, will come out to vote. However, the Government is sure of a majority of four hundred at least, which should be fairly satisfactory to Hon. B. Frank Smith, the minister of public works, and his colleagues, if not so pleasing to ex-Solicitor-General Jones, ex-Valley Railway supporter George W. Upham and Mr. Andrew D. McCain.

Trying to Save His Bacon.

The opposition are banking strong hopes on the personal popularity and professional standing of Mr. Jones, and a determined effort will be made to induce enough voters to split their ballots to elect Mr. Jones and leave Messrs. Upham and McCain to the fate of the fallen. It is only a few months ago that the opposition was making determined efforts to obtain personal votes for Mr. McCain, to the exclusion of Mr. Upham, and now Mr. McCain has the pleasant experience of feeling the party knife between his own ribs.

Sine to Answer For.

When the opposition count on Mr. Jones running ahead of his ticket they are reckoning without their host and camp followers, however, as the people of this county have not forgotten that Mr. Jones was not merely a supporter of the old plunderbund government, but was himself a member of that aggregation, and as such responsible for their sins—sins so grievous that Mr. W. E. Foster has announced that the present opposition has nothing to do with the acts of that government previous to the year 1908.

Never Refuses Fees.

In this connection this county has not forgotten the further interesting fact that when a member of the old government, Mr. Jones received a fee of \$5,000 in cold cash from the provincial treasury for taking a pleasant holiday trip to England for the purpose of arguing a case before the English courts. It might be added that the tax payers in the province also paid the English lawyer who argued the case after Mr. Jones had taken the trip referred to, and that down to the 16th day of February, 1917, no tax payer of the province has received the slightest benefit, directly or indirectly, from the money which the government paid.

Government Strong.

As proof of the strength of the Government party in this county we need only call attention to the fact that a nomination on the ticket does not go begging—in fact a fourth man was nominated at the Woodstock convention on Saturday last in the person of Councillor E. C. Morgan, a Hartland man, who withdrew in favor of Mr. White in view of the fact that Mr. White had been the sitting member.

Mr. Morgan by his manly and straightforward stand which he took at the convention, and by the speeches which he is making at different parts of the county throughout the campaign has created a very favorable impression, not only in his own party, but also with the independent elector, and in the ordinary course of events he will no doubt at some future time have the honor of representing this constituency at Fredericton or in a still higher arena.

The "good roads" policy of Hon. Mr. Smith is popular among all classes, and is sufficient in itself, in the St. John Valley at least, to return a solid delegation.

Mrs. Robt. Pepper.
The death took place yesterday morning of Mrs. Sarah, widow of Mr. Robert Pepper, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. C. W. Taylor, St. Andrews street. The deceased was 87 years of age and death was due to heart failure. Mrs. Pepper was a native of Northamptonshire, England, and came to St. John with her husband about 40 years ago. Besides her daughter, she is survived by two sons, Mr. W. S. Pepper, with a Chipman Smith & Co., Bathurst, and Mr. J. Harry Pepper, New York. Her husband died about 11 years ago.
