EXTRAORDINARY POPULAR DEMON-STRATIONS IN ENGLAND!

[BY CABLE.] LONDON, Feb'v. 26-Midnight.

To-day is to be observed as one of thanksgiving for the recovery of the Prince of Wales. For two weeks past the city has been filling with strangers, and is now overflowing.
