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Shipping News.

Missing.—A correspondent of the Halifax Express, writing from the Magdalen Islands, states that on the 10th December a schooner left House Harbor for Prince Edward Island for Pictou, having on board the captain and crew of the bank Agnora, of this port, wrecked at the island a few days previous, and not having since been heard from, it is feared all have perished.

Accident.—Captain Hunt, sailing as mate a vessel now loading at Calais, had his leg fractured and his foot and ankle severely crushed, on the 27th inst., by a quantity of lumber falling on him.

Departure of New Vessels.—Three new vessels sailed out of our port yesterday, the ship Breadalbane, 1420 tons, for Liverpool; the Mary A. Myhrhall, 625 tons, Tucker, master, for St. John's; and the Forest, 1425 tons, built at Windsor, N. S., also bound to Liverpool.

The W. Duncombe, Government cutter, sailed for Pictou yesterday. She is to be employed surveying in the Gulf of St. Lawrence during the present summer.

Bark Sunk in Newburg Harbor.—The bark James Manry, Saunders, master, chartered by Messrs. Chas. McLaughlin & Son to carry a cargo of deals to Queens-town, while being towed out of Musquash harbor yesterday afternoon, grounded on the Bank, listed over and immediately filled with water.

The Scud makes her last trip for the season on Monday next. The Express, which has been handily fitted up and thoroughly overhauled during the time she has been laid up, will take her place, making her first trip to Digby and Annapolis on Wednesday, the 14th proximo.

The Dominion steamer Lady Head, which arrived at Halifax on the 28th inst., after a fine run of 11 days.

The Quebec and Gulf Ports S. S. Co.'s new steamer Hadji, arrived at Quebec on the 23rd inst., from Liverpool, having made the passage in 15 days.

The New York left Eastport on the 17th inst. She will probably reach here by 5 o'clock.

The Linda arrived this morning from Boston via Yarmouth. She sails again for Yarmouth this evening at five o'clock.

The May Queen leaves her wharf at Indiantown, for Grand Lake, to-morrow, at 2 p.m.
