DRAWS LARGE CROWD

Best in History of Association.

The doors of the Waterloo Poultry Show were thrown open to the public last night and the committee in charge were indeed gratified at the hearty response of the citizens who turned out in large numbers. In fact the attendance was the largest on record and as the quality and number of entries was the largest in the history of the association those who turned out last night more than got their money's worth. One of the outstanding features of this year is the quality of the birds shown none better being exhibited as any of the western Ontario shows of any town the size of Waterloo. At the present rate in which the entry list is growing the entire basement will have to be used next year. The judging has been completed and visitors today and to-morrow will view prize stock which is hard to beat. The building will be open all day and to-morrow and will conclude tomorrow night.

SPIRITED CONTEST
ASSURED TOMORROW

All Four Candidates for the Mayor's Chair Are Confident.

Tomorrow is New Year's Day and the town of Waterloo striving successfully to keep pace with the larger centres, voting for municipal honours will take place the council election by the passing of a bylaw changing the date from the first Monday in January deciding that a fuller and more comprehensive opinion can be expressed on the first day of the year than a few days later. The change we believe will work out satisfactorily all around and it is fully expected that a large vote will be polled. While the ratepayers will be represented by the town councillors were all elected by acclamation a spirited contest is assured for the Mayoralty, and with four in the field for the Chief Magistrate's Chair there promises to be a lively contest. The four contestants, D. Bohlender, A.H. Cochrane, L. Holle and H. Sturm have all served in the Council and anyone of them would undoubtedly fill the position with honor. A time there was taken place for their views on the questions at issue and gave an account of their stewardship but nomination night the past few years has been a sort of a long routine of hearing chairmen's reports from all civic bodies, speeches from many nominees who have no intention of seeking the support of the electors and the outcome of the whole matter has been that the candidates have not had the opportunity to state their platform and to present themselves for election on their merits. As we have already stated the candidates for the Mayoralty have had considerable municipal experience and no doubt their past record will either elect them or leave them at home.

Mr. Bohlender having had 5 years on the municipal board as a councillor one as Deputy Reeve and two as Reeve is in line for promotion. During his term of office as a public chairman of the Fire Department and during that time an extra term was purchased which has more than paid for itself. He was also chairman of the Charity and a public citizen in council statement speaks for itself. Mr. Cochrane has been connected with the Waterloo Manufacturing Company the past 17 years being the purchasing agent and collector a position he has filled with great credit.

Mr. L. Holle has had four years experience in the Council and while not being appointed to any of the chairmanships he has endeavored to use fair judgment in all civic matters. In conversation with him this morning The Record learned that he did not favor the holding of the Finance meetings the Friday previous to the regular meeting in getting all the accounts in making it necessary to hold a short session of Finance on Council nights. He also said while he was being criticized for not attending all the special meetings his only explanation was they were called on short

notice and in his opinion were not legal. He did not wish to take any of the credit for any good measure passed as he considered he was only one of the nine who considered questions in the interests of the town.

He is one of the towns young business men having conducted a successful cigar store and pool room the past 8 years and his progressiveness should stand him in good stead at the forthcoming elections.

CIVIL SERVICE MAKING PROTEST

OTTAWA, Dec. 31.—Revolt against the civil service reclassification bids fair to spread. Public Works employees have already organized and are making strong representations through Deputy Minister Hunter to the government. They maintain that nearly all classes the classification decreases the salaries of the employees and they demand that a civil service board of appeal be appointed.

Following the lead of the Public Works, the employees of the Department of Agriculture are organizing for a similar purpose and other departments may follow suit. Generally speaking it may be said that the reclassification has not given satisfaction. While at present there are no indications of any "walk out" it is difficult to say how far the dissatisfaction will go toward injuring the efficiency of the service.
