Celebrated German Writer Forecasts that Emperor Wilhelm Will Hold On to the Reigns of Power But For a Short Time, But Will Abdicate.

Paris, March 24.—The abdication of the German Emperor is forecasted by the former German magistrate, who wrote the celebrated book, "I Accuse." In an interview published in Oeuvre, he says: "The Kaiser is obsessed by the thought that he is responsible for the war, a thought which poisons his whole existence. He feels that he is menaced by three enemies at home, without counting those abroad: First, the Crown Prince, the real author of the war; second, is the junker pan-Germanist_you cannot imagine the smouldering hatred of the Emperor for those whom he believes to be maniacs and who are driving him into an abyss-third, are the people, not the socialist party, but the people who are starving and who he feels are growing in number and rising little by little against those who are ganized the war.
