

A bench, 20 inches high, 18 inches across, a top watch and a metronome are supervised by a Medical Officer. On a signal from the supervisor. the airmen being tested step up on to and down off the bench at the rate of thirty times a minute for five minutes or one hundred and fifty times. On completion he is given a one minute rest and a half minute pulse reading is then taken. Then he has two more half minute Then he has two more half minute pulse readings following each. The pulse readings are added together and by means of a correlated table, mathematically established, a percentage score of physical fitness is established. Every airman must attain a certain score on this test before he leaves I.T.S. If he fails in the first test which is given in the seventh week of his course, he is given special attention and extra periods of duty fitness until he can successfully pass the test.

As a tribute to the N.C.Os, in charge of the Duty Fitness program at No. 4 I.T.S. it might be pointed out that the percentage of failures on the first test ranges between one and four per cent.


