y money, there are about 15 families on this Reserve,
of whom are engaged in fishing and lumbering.

We left Michipicoten Harbour by train on the
oon of the 17th, inst., for Hawk Junction, staying
the night. We left Hawk Juction at noon on the
inst., for Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., arriving home
.00 p.m.

The Indians on the Reserves visited seem to be
quiet and inoffensive lot, with the exception of the
and at Michipicoten Harbour, these appear to be quarrel-
some, explanation of this is no doubt due to the facts
report upon in separate report.

Most of the Indians are engaged in the fishing
and lumbering industries and results appear favourably
with that of the white population engaged in the same
kind of work.
