
Sir:-

I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 6th March, in which you have signified that the Committee of the Anti-Slavery and Aborigines Protection Society have assented to this Department's request that the title to Lennox Island Indian Reserve, Prince Edward Island, Canada, now vested in the Trustees of the said Society, shall be transferred to His Majesty the King, as represented by the Superintendent General of Indian Affairs in trust for the Indians of Prince Edward Island.

The Department desires to express appreciation of the resolution passed by the Committee of the Society in this matter, and has observed with interest that the resolution bearing on the matter was moved by Mr. Thomas Hodgkin D.C.L., one of the two surviving trustees.

I beg to transmit herewith a draft indenture for execution by the representatives of the Society. When this indenture is returned duly executed the transfer of the deed will be registered in the Registry Office at Summerside, Prince Edward Island.
