

- Jan. 4. Percy J. Philip in New York Times gives a year-end review of Canadian position. (Dec.31/44)
- Jan. 4. The Rev.T.T.Shields of Toronto said at Owen Sound that "a vote for McNaughton would be a vote for the Roman Catholic hierarchy and against the safety and welfare of fighting men overseas." He also said that "if McNaughton is elected, perhaps King would interpret it as an endorsement of his policies and might even extend the life of Parliament."
- Jan. 6. Air Vice Marshal A.E.Godfrey accepted the nomination as C.C.F. candidate in North Grey.
- Jan. 6. According to Air Marshal Bishop, speaking in New York, the recent international air conference at Chicago nearly collapsed because delegates were only interested in carrying away as much booty as possible.
- Jan. 6. Hon. W.F.A.Turgeon, Canadian Ambassador to Belgium, arrived at Brussels to assume his new post.
- Jan. 7. The Ontario provincial leader of the C.C.F. told a press conference that the C.C.F. caucus held in North Bay Jan. 6 and 7 concerned itself with provincial financing, social ownership of certain industries and civil service reform.
- Jan.7. The Charge d'Affaires of the Canadian Embassy, Hector Allard, has asked the Foreign Office for all information in the enforced departure from Mexico of Wm. Krehm, Canadian subject, who is correspondent in Mexico City for Time Magazine.
- Jan. 7. Hon. Ray Atherton, U.S.Ambassador to Canada said in Chicago that the time had come for all to accept the responsibility which goes with world economic leadership. He made references to Canada and the U.S.
- Jan.7. In a news story by the C.P. it was stated that the Sundry Pictorial said that 1500 Canadian prisoners of war in Stalag 11D attempted a mass break-out last November and that some were killed. An External Affairs spokesman suggested that the report was incorrect.
