A cord of wood contains 128 cubic feet; in a pile it measures 8 feet long, 4 feet wide, and 4 feet high. A cordwood length is 8 feet, and a short cord 3 feet long, cut to a height of 4 feet would measure 112 feet, and if sold as a cord would be worth more than 16 feet, or just 128 per cent. If cord cut 4 ft. lengths is selling for \$10 a cord, that cut only 3 ft. long should sell for \$8 a cord. In old times the custom used to be to pile cordwood 4 ft. 4 in. high, the cord measure thus being 138 1/2 cubic feet.
