so-called stupidity, which is very characteristic of the race, that is one of the best qualities of the British race, when it can accept these statements and then coolly look the situation in the face.

At the outbreak of the war Germany was the strongest military nation in the world. But on the sea Great Britain's fleet was supreme. The German flag has been driven off the high seas. With the control of the sea, the necessary men at hand and the just cause for which you are contending, there is no reason why victory shouldn't be yours if you are in readiness to take the necessary steps. The time must come, too, and very shortly, when Germany will not have enough men to keep her trenches.

You have large resources in this country, but what good are they if you cannot concentrate and organize them to give the results needed to help in winning a final and complete victory? How can you raise sufficient men? During the first year of the war there were 100,000 men enlisted for overseas service. During this year of the war you have to raise the number of enlistments to 500,000. This means 250,000 men this year. During the first year the financial depression made employment scarce. The conditions then for enlistment were remarkably good. During this second year of the war what is the situation you face? The country has been blessed with a marvellous crop throughout Western Canada, coupled with the large munition and war orders. These have revolutionized the labor conditions in Canada. There is now plenty of labor for all, and this changes the favorable enlistment condition considerably. If the record is kept up that has been so far established this year that necessary 250,000 will be raised. Men of all political standing must get together and work out the question of how to raise the men and still be able to handle the industries. But you cannot provide the men necessary, make the equipment for them and still keep up the Canadian resources without making a sacrifice. You must comply with the request of the Government and meet the situation bravely. The women must undertake some of the men's work, to let them go, as the women of France and Belgium have done. You must equip yourselves to face the situation.

The men who must go first are those of military age, between 18 and 45, who are physically fit. Value as you may your own lives, there is something more precious and valuable than them. Here is a chance for young men to take their lives and sacrifice them for the preservation of all that Christian civilization has given us. The man who helps to win for our humanity and drives away the menace of German militarism, and helps to bring the time nearer when international peace will be supreme, has served his day and generation by the

CHERNIAVSKY'S TRIUMPH

Jan. 17.—The Cherniavsky's triumph in Canada has awakened enormous interest and there are no more popular artists in Canada than these three young artists.

During the two visits of Leo, Jan and Mischel Cherniavsky to India and the Far East, they scored a series of great successes that aroused the audiences as they had never been aroused before. The tropical climates develop a sort of lethargic audience; but the work of the Cherniavskys just carried them out of themselves.

The "Advocate" of India, Dec. 27th 1913, said: "The best concert ever heard in Bombay." This was the verdict of a crowded and enthusiastic audience passed last evening after listening to the performances of Leo, Jan and Mischel Cherniavsky, at the Town Hall. It was the first concert the young Russians had given in the East, and they made good instantaneously.

The Bombay audience usually unresponsive and coldly critical, was last night moved to great enthusiasm. Directly the young Russians stepped upon the platform, it was evident they would be well received, for there is magnetism and fascination about their strong personalities that makes a direct appeal. The Cherniavskys put their entire soul into their playing, whether it was a grand and breathless finale, or a light and delicate pianissimo passage. Mischel has wonderful power over his instrument and will be the darling of India before the tour is over. Jan's magical touch on the piano was well shown in selections from the works of Chopin and Liszt, while as an encore he gave a dainty and melodious composition of his own. Leo opened the second half of the programme with a masterly rendering on the violin of the first movement of Tschickowsky's violin concerto in D Major.

These famous Russian artists appear here for one return concert on Thursday, Feb. 3. The plan opens at Boles Drug Store on Jan. 26th.
