THE NEWS IN BRIEF

THE WEEK'S HAPPENINGS TOLD IN A FEW LINES.

All the News Condensed in as Brief a Form as Possible for Reporter Readers.

The King has presented Osborne to the nation.

King Edward was crowned on Saturday at 12.30.

Dr. S. J. Hopkins of Port Colborne dropped dead.

The British Parliament has adjourned till October.

Peter July, of Alexandria Bay, was 99 years of age last Saturday.

The corner stone of King Edward School was laid at Hamilton.

The by-law to bonus a furniture factory was carried at Cornwall.

The corner stone of the Arnprior Baptist Church was laid last week.

Winnipeg won the four oared race in the National regatta at Worcester.

Joseph Tissot, the artist, illustrator of "The Life of Christ," is dead.

The total winnings of the Canadian Bisley team amounted to £514 14s. 11d.

The peach and pear crop in the Niagara district will be larger than last year.

By a vote of 55 to 3, Arnprior has voted \$20,000 for extension of water works.

At San Angelo, Texas, fire destroyed the Landon Hotel, burning seven people to death.

The international tournament at Niagara will be held on August 27 and following days.

Dr. Thomas Christie, M. P. for Argenteuil died at his home in Lachine, Que., on Tuesday.

The assessment of real estate in Montreal will be boosted this year by about \$3,000,000.

The Canadian Pacific Railway will spend \$200,000 in reconstructing the yards at North Bay.

The Canadian Bisley team sailed from Liverpool by the steamship Lake Simcoe on Tuesday.

Horse races will be held at Perth on September 1st and 2nd, and \$800 will be offered in prizes.

The British rifle team to compete at Ottawa for the palma trophy sailed for Canada on Tuesday.

Sergt. Geo. Armstrong, whose next of kin lives at St. Mary's, Ont., died of enteric in South Africa.

The citizens of Calgary have subscribed \$5,000 for the erection of a Salvation Army barracks.

Winnipeg Industrial Exhibition receipts this year show an increase of \$18,325.91 over last year.

Sir Alexander McKennie has been engaged to conduct a series of musical festivals in Canada next April.

General Lucas Meyer, formerly commanding the troops of the Orange Free State, died of heart disease at Brussels.

The Dohertys, English players, won the international lawn tennis doubles, beating the American champions at New York.

Two Parisians perished from exposure on Mount Blanc, and their two guides were killed while descending for assistance.

Over 300 people were thrown into the river at Isle Grébois, near Montreal, by the collapse of a wharf. All were rescued.

Several British journalists will arrive in Canada this week. Some are on board the Tunisian and others on the Lake Champlain.

Sir Thomas Slaughter says the possibility of the C. P. R. running to Midland has been discussed, but nothing has been decided.

Napanee will shortly be made the junction for the Bay of Quinte and Grand Trunk trains. Deseronto Junction will be closed.

There is a matrimonial epidemic among the telephone girls in Montreal no less than sixty having been married within the last month.

The youngest son of Rev. G. H. Williams, Methodist minister of Delta, was accidentally drowned at Whiskey Island while the family were spending the day at the Ransome cottage, near Delta on Beyerley Lake.

BUS TEAM RAN AWAY.

Mr. F. Pierce's Horses Provide Excitement on a Quiet Day but do no Damage.

The quiet of Coronation Day in Athens was broken by a runaway, Mr. F. Pierce's bus team providing the excitement without doing any damage. The driver, Mr. Wm. Shinnick, had very kindly taken a lady from the evening train around to the Mr. Hayes' on Elgin street, and was carrying her valise in the house, when the horses, always on the alert for just such an opening, started off at a very lively pace before the driver could reach them. They ran along Elgin, turned down Main street and then the race commenced through the street as fast as they could go. Men yelled "Whoa! Whoa!" and a few made vain attempts to stop the horses. Five o'clock teas were interrupted, children forgot their games and everybody rushed to see the cause of the excitement. The horses ran right through the Main street in the town and got to within a mile of Addison before they were stopped. This feat was accomplished by Mr. Rice Freeman. Strange to say no damage was done to the bus, horses or harness. "Old Jim," now 22 years of age, who has been on the bus for 14 years, guided his more spirited mate well, but kept up the pace to the end. Several vehicles were safely passed on the way. Mr. R. D.
