NEAR BAIKIES

GOTTHE DROP ON HIM

CONVICT WHO COULDN'T RESIST THE FORCE OF HABIT.

The Gratification of His Wild Desire Caused a Sentry on Alentras Island to Spend a Decidedly Uncomforta-

"In reading a few days ago of the es cape of four long time prisoners from Al-catraz island, the military prison in the harbor of San Francisco," said an ex-sol dier of the regular army who now lives in Washington, "I was pretty forcibly re-minded of an experience I once had on Alcatraz with a prisoner—of the only time in my life, in fact, when I ever dropped under the gun, on which occasion I found out that being under the gun is neither exhilarating nor entertaining. "I was soldiering as a buck private

with one of the two artillery batteries stationed on Alcatras island, which is seven acre rock right in the middle of Frisco harbor, and of a most forbidding aspect. Some of the guard posts were comparative snaps, and the soldier who appeared on guard in the best shape as to his conjugation. his equipments and general appearance was given the privilege of picking out these snaps instead of being compelled to walk post two hours on and four off ducing his 24 hour period of guard duty. One of the best of these snap tricks was that of the man picked out to be present at the Alcatraz dock, with a pistol strap ped around his waist, when the government tug stopped at the island, as it did several times a day. The only other bit of work that the man on this duty had to do was to get up at 4 o'clock in the morning, awaken the convict coek who prepared the prisoners' meals, accompany him to the prison kitchen, a gloomy room below the prison, against which the wa-ters of the Pacific storm the year round, and stay with him until the prisoners breakfast was prepared. This wasn't such a bad job, for the convict cook al ways prepared the guard an unusually good breakfast, if he liked him. I used to capture that guard trick every time mounted guard, and after a few months

got to know the convict cook pretty well "This fellow was an Arizona desperado with a record named Caldwell. He had enlisted in a cavalry outfit in Arizo na, stabbed a trooper against whom he formed a grudge, jumped the layout, been captured and given a 12 year bit on Alcatraz to so. He had done four years of the stretch when I first woke him up and conducted him to the kitchen. Caldwell was a genuinely bad lot and no mistake. But he was a crackerjack cook, having done that work for innumerable camping outfits before enlisting, and they permitted him to do that work with the ball and chain to hamper him. When I first took the snap trick that required me to accompany Caldwell to the prison kitchen, the sergeant of the guard warned me that I'd better keep a weather eye on the man, that he was a real hard one and that it would be the part of wisdon to keep the flap of my pistol holster un-buttoned all the time I was with him and

also to keep out of the range of the iron ball attached to the cook's leg.
"One clammy, foggy morning I roused Caldwell out of his cell with unusual Caldwell out of his cell with unusual anticipation, for I had lost my supper at the battery mess the evening before by ling late for it, so that I was hungry and in great shape for some of Caldwell's fried steak and potatoes and coffee. Caldwell and the west for the meal for me before he started to prepare the con-victs' breakfast, and when he set it be-fore me I sat down at the wooden table ravenously, hunger making me forget all about my job of keeping an eye on a prisoner known to be desperate. I was eating away, while Caldwell clomped around the kitchen, dragging the heavy ball after him, when suddenly I felt a sharp tug at the holster strapped on my light side. When I honed up in alarm. right side. When I hopped up in alarm, I was too late. Caldwell, with a queer expression in his eyes, had my gun on a dead line with the middle of my fore-

head.
"Me? Oh, I sat right down again and looked at Caldwell. What else was there to do? "'Well, son,' said he to me, never tak-ing that gun off my head for an instant,

'how do you feel?'
"'Like one who formerly was,' said I, gulping. 'What's the gag, Caldwell?'
"'I'm going to do you,' said Caldwell,
