They were driving to the home of G. W. Neidig when struck by the engine.

TO SAVE NIAGARA FALLS

Spectacular Value is Equal to the Commercial.

Treaty Will Be Required—Prompt Measures Necessary—U. S. Section of Waterways Commission Recommends That No Permits for More Than 23,500 Cubic Feet of Water Per Second Be Granted.

Washington, March 26.—If Niagara Falls is to be preserved as one of the wonders of the world, immediate action by the United States and Canada is required, according to the findings of the American members of the international waterways commission, which has for the past year been studying the condition at the falls and in the tributary great lakes. This report is signed by Gen. A. H. Ernst, chairman, and the other American members of the commission.

The United States section of the international waterways commission, reporting as to Niagara Falls, says: Charters have been granted to corporations which propose to divert additional amounts in quantities not now limited. The sums of money invested, or being invested, in the works now in operation, or under construction, and in the industries dependent upon them, amount to many millions of dollars. It is probably not expedient to attempt the withdrawal of the rights thus utilized. The commercial value of the water-power at Niagara Falls is very great, but if compared with values set aside by wealthy communities elsewhere for park purposes, this value is not too great to be devoted to similar purposes. The place is visited annually by about 800,000 people.

If the falls are to be preserved, it must be by mutual agreement between the two countries. As a step in that direction it is recommended that legislation be enacted by which the Secretary of War will be authorized to grant permits for the diversion of 23,500 cubic feet per second, and no more, from the waters naturally tributary to Niagara Falls. All other diversions of water which is naturally tributary to Niagara Falls to be prohibited, except such as may be required for domestic use or for the service of locks in navigation canals.

The prohibition to remain in force two years, and then to become the permanent law of the land, if in the meantime the Canadian Government shall have enacted legislation prohibiting the diversion of water which is naturally tributary to Niagara Falls, in excess of 26,000 cubic feet per second, not including the amount required for domestic use or for the service of locks in navigation canals.

CZAR TO RECOUP THEM.

Loan of Five Millions to Suffering Russian Landlords.

St. Petersburg, March 26.—The council of the empire has adopted the project to grant a loan of \$5,000,000 to landlords who suffer from the agrarian troubles. The loan is repayable in 40 years, but will not bear interest until 1910.

A delegation representing the Russians in Poland, the Baltic provinces and Lithuania appeared before the Emperor Saturday and pleaded for separate representation in the Lower House of Parliament, contending that, as they are in the minority, they will not be shown any mercy by the non-Russian population. The Emperor promised to order an investigation into the whole question.

The Russ Saturday prints an exposure of Chief of Police Greun of Warsaw, charging him with having been sentenced to loss of civil rights and to a year's imprisonment at hard labor for bribery, extortion and oppression.

Jap Spies Caught.

Vladivostok, Russia, March 26.—Two Japanese merchants were arrested Saturday in one of the forts here. In their possession were found plans of the fortifications and notes referring to them.

Georgians Ask Autonomy.

Tiflis, Transcaucasia, March 24.—The Georgians have presented the viceroy of the Caucasus with a demand for the autonomy of their church. The viceroy promised to lay the matter before the authorities at St. Petersburg.

SENTRIES AT BANK DOORS.

Continued Operations by Robbers Move Authorities to Act.

Warsaw, March 26.—The paymaster of the Vistula Railroad was Saturday shot by robbers, who secured \$3,500 from him. Owing to continual robberies, the authorities are placing sentries at the doors of private banks.

Thirty-four girls working in Kindler's mills, at Fabianston, ten miles southwest of Lodz, on refusing to join a strike, were yesterday poisoned by a powder that was strewn upon a floor of the mill. One of the girls died from the effects of the poison, and the remainder are seriously ill, ten of them not being expected to recover.

Girl Loses Her Case.

Winnipeg, March 26.—Isabel de Tanbe has failed in her suit in the Winnipeg Assizes against G. W. Hunt, W. B. McNaughton and B. McDonald of the Ottawa Fruit and Produce Exchange. The plaintiff was employed by the exchange as cashier, and one day there was a shortage of \$63 in her takings. She was arrested and taken before Alexander McMilliken, stipendiary magistrate, and the case was dismissed, there being no evidence to connect the young woman with the alleged theft. She sued for \$6,000 for false arrest and imprisonment.

Warship Ordered to China.

Manila, March 26.—The American battleship Wisconsin sailed at midnight Saturday for Shanghai to join the American fleet there, rush orders to that effect having been received from Rear Admiral Train.

Scotch Immigrants Coming.

London, March 26.—Scottish emigrants to the number of 2,900 left the Clyde yesterday afternoon on three steamships, bound for the United States and Canada.

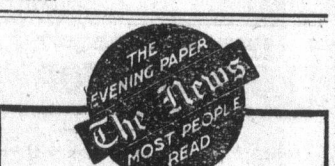

ESKIMO WOMEN.

Rude Arctic Tribes Have Little Respect For Marriage Bond.

The United States general agent of education in Alaska, writing in the Metropolitan Magazine of life among the Eskimos, says in regard to the women of the tribes:

There is no special ceremony among the Alaskan Eskimos connected with marriage. If the parties are young, it is largely arranged by the parents. Among some of the tribes the husband joins the wife's family and is expected to hunt and fish for them. If he refuses to give his father-in-law the furs he takes he is driven out of the house, and some one else more active and obedient is installed as husband of the girl. Sometimes a young woman has in turn ten or twelve husbands before she finally settles down to a permanent married state. Under this condition of things it is not strange that the women become indifferent and often untrue to their husbands. Love and mutual affection have so little to do with the marital relation that occasionally husbands and wives are interchanged.

For instance, in one of the northern villages dwelt a family of expert fishers and another that was successful at hunting the reindeer. One year the fisherman thought he would like to hunt reindeer. Finding that his neighbor would like to try fishing, they exchanged wives for the summer. The woman who was a good hunter went off with the fisherman, and vice versa. Upon returning home in the fall they returned to their respective husbands. Eskimo wives are frequently beaten by their husbands and sometimes to escape abuse commit suicide. Occasionally a wife resists and if physically stronger thrashes the husband. Polygamy prevails to a limited extent. Frequently the second wife is looked upon and treated as a servant in the family.

Among Eskimos, the same as among all uncivilized people, woman's is a hard lot, and yet, notwithstanding all her disadvantages, she has a voice in both village and family affairs. The husband neither makes an important bargain nor plans a trip without consulting and referring to his wife. Large families of children are the exception; few have above four. The drudgery of women is sure that they sometimes destroy their offspring, particularly if the child be a girl. If a family is very poor they sometimes give away to childless neighbors all their children but one. Thus during childhood a boy may pass from one to another, to be adopted by several families in turn. Children are also sold by their parents, the usual market price of a child being a seal skin bag of oil or an old suit of clothes. The children are given names of various animals, bird, fish, sections of country, winds, and heavenly bodies, etc. Sometimes they have as many as six names. Children are rarely punished. They generally have their own way and are usually treated with great kindness by their own or foster parents.

Gold the Earth Gets Back.

Gold reverts to the earth in many ways. Treasure troves are being unearthed constantly, especially in foreign countries and in romantic countries, such as Mexico, the Indies and South America, where passions and riches run like the tides, high and low. Isn't it natural that a lover of Mexican should bury his treasure rather than think his rival might get it? Many treasures have been buried in the desert, and a lone rider at dead of night might be seen in the old days digging up the gold he needed from time to time. The secret was his, and his alone. If he should chance to meet death suddenly, the secret died with him. The excavations that are being made in Greece and Egypt show gold trimmed ornaments, jewelry and precious stones that have lain for centuries beneath cities whose struggle for gold has contrasted strangely with the calm wealth lying just below them.

These treasure troves which come to the surface every year probably represent but a small part of that which has been concealed, and every ship which founders at sea takes a certain amount of gold with it, which may amount to anywhere from a few pounds to millions.

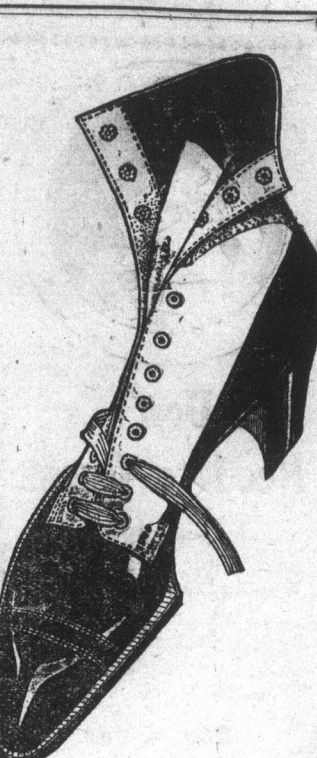
