Editorial Brevities.

March has been rather lion-like but is going out "like a lamb."

The war is costing Canada \$550,000 a day exclusive of Canada's share of imperial expenditures, which cannot be paid until later.

The little kingdom of Serbia seems to have suffered from the effects of the war to a greater extent than any of the other Allied nations. Prince Alexander declares Serbia has lost a million of her people, or a fifth of her total population.

There are ten seats now vacant in the House of Commons, these being Prince County, Prince Edward Island, Kings and Yarmouth, Nova Scotia; Carleton, East Hamilton, East Gray, and Lincoln, Ontario; Kent, Quebec; New Brunswick; L'Esperance and Brandon, Manitoba. Seven of the seats were formerly held by Conservatives and three by Liberals.

Conservative newspapers state that the only way for Lord Shaughnessy to atone for the speech he made at a recruiting meeting in Montreal is to start recruiting in Quebec. So far he has not done badly, for he has given two sons to the army. Regarding recruiting in Quebec the Province is behind. Ontario has given 110,000 men, Quebec only 29,000 while the ratio should be 93,000. Ontario papers state that conscription should be put in force in Quebec, only they add it would result in rioting and quasi-rebellion, which would have a bad effect.

All over Canada, wherever Canadian troops are gathered in large numbers, Y. M. C. A. representatives are engaged in various lines of welfare work for the soldiers. In the Maritime Provinces eleven men are laboring with twelve different units, serving 8000 men, and several additional appointments are planned. The Secretary for the Maritime Provinces, A. S. McAllister, reports that six additional men are being commissioned to go overseas with the contingents about to sail. Reading and writing materials are being supplied the troops embarking from St. John and Halifax. The Y. M. C. A. men accompany the soldiers not only to the camps in England but right into the trenches and work frequently under fire.

United States At War.

The United States is at war. The campaign is not a very extensive one so far—a few thousand soldiers have started out to capture a Mexican outlaw, who is known to be responsible for the death of a score or more of American citizens. This outlaw, Villa by name, has been carrying on a campaign of murder and arson throughout Mexico for some time. Not so long ago he and the present President of Mexico, Carranza, were more or less friendly, but when the United States government acknowledged Carranza, Villa, who always commanded quite a respectable following, started a rebellion against his friend. Not long ago he crossed the border into the United States, set fire to one of the frontier towns and together with his followers deliberately murdered several respectable American citizens, and then escaped back into Mexico. A few days later American troops started after him, but so far Villa has kept out of their way. He is said to be hiding in the mountains, and many believe he will never be taken. Meantime a feeling against the Americans seems to be growing. The Mexicans do not like the look of American troops in their country, and trouble is feared. Of course the American government did not invade Mexico without securing the consent of President Carranza, but late reports state that a number of Carranza's troops have deserted and gone over to the support of Villa and against the Americans. The authorities at Washington realize that the situation is growing serious and needs mighty careful handling to prevent war between the two nations.

At this distance it is difficult to see how trouble can be avoided. Let us suppose several thousand American soldiers invaded this country from Maine in search of an alleged outlaw. Even if they were to exercise the greatest care to avoid trouble, one can easily imagine how the majority of us would feel about such an "invasion." The Mexicans probably feel very much the same way. It begins to look as if President Wilson would have to withdraw his troops from Mexican soil altogether or send a very much larger force. The latter course would almost certainly mean war and the United States is not ready for war even with the Mexicans. However that country has been unsettled for several years. A most every inch of ground has been fought over; thousands have lost their lives; millions of dollars worth of property has been destroyed, and even Carranza has so far been unable to bring order out of chaos. It is a pity the United States is not in a position to settle the Mexican trouble for all time. Mexico is naturally one of the richest countries in the world and with a good form of government should prosper exceedingly.

The Price of Footwear.

In 1917 when its population was 87,326,539 the United States had 15,595,731 beef cattle. This year, with a population of 103,000,000, there are only 39,453,000 beef cattle. During the period since 1917 new uses for leather have been developed, and this, added to the shortage in hides, has caused the steady advance in the price of footwear, with the tendency still very strongly upward. It is also pointed out at the present time that the embargo placed by London and Paris on raw material, especially calf-skin and goatskins, and the difficulty of procuring freight space to bring the goods to the American market are other direct causes of the shortage of leather.

The Shoe Retailer of Boston tells of conditions in that country, and what is true there applies as well to Canada. It says:—

"The question of price is a disturbing factor. Everyone recognizes that the unusual conditions in the leather market, largely due to the tremendous consumption of leather for army shoes, and for the export trade, combined with the impossibility of securing adequate supplies of raw stock from many countries that formerly sent their skins to America, has brought about a condition that no one can escape. Leather is high and shoes are going to cost more to make, and retailers are going to pay more for them. There is no escaping this fact. There are few, if any, manufacturers who have a sufficient supply of sole or upper leather to carry them through the coming season. They know what their shoes will cost figured up in the prices of leather which they now have in their factories, but beyond that they cannot even guess what they will be compelled to pay for stock when it is necessary for them to go into the market, as most of them must."

It is safe to assume that the present high prices for footwear will be followed by still higher prices, and that this condition will last for a very considerable time.

Dominion Will Back up the Provinces.

Ottawa, March 28.—Shortly after one o'clock this morning the Stevens-Marcel resolution calling for Dominion-wide prohibition was disposed of by the adoption of the amendment moved by R. B. Bennett on a division of 67 to 46, a majority in favor of the Bennett amendment of 21. Mr. Bennett's amendment was in line with the government bill introduced by Hon. C. J. Doherty the other day, declaring that when prohibition has been decided on by a province the transportation or importation of liquor into that province for purposes contrary to the provincial laws is forbidden. The division was the most interesting of the session. Five conservatives voted against the amendment. They were H. H. Stevens, Vancouver, the mover; W. Wright, Muskoka; Andrew Broder, Dundas; Achin P. Labelle and Thornton of Durham.

Underwear Co. being opened at Windsor requires a quarter of a million pounds of wool.
