Kansas Mountain Landis, baseball commissioner, after an exhaustive investigation, announced that he found no justification for the charges published in the Nashville (Tenn.) Banner that players Elchrodt and Roy of the Nashville club were to be switched to New Orleans via the Cleveland American club, which holds their contracts, to aid the New Orleans club in winning the Southern Association pennant.
John D. Martin, president of the Southern Association, concurred in the decision absorbing Elchrodt and Roy and also officials of the two clubs.

CHICAGO, Aug. 30.—Babe Ruth, king of swat, will not play in 1926 with the New York Yankees, he told a group of newspapermen here to-night upon his arrival from St. Louis. This statement was qualified, however, with the proviso that Ruth would quit if Miller Huggins was retained as manager.
Ruth told newspaper men that he was under contract to the Yankees for the 1926 season and that if Huggins was retained, it would be necessary to trade the Bambino to some other team.

Fine of \$5,000 on Babe Ruth Is Endorsed by Col. Ruppert

Owner of Yankees Endorses Indefinite Suspension of King of Swat.

New York, Aug. 31.—Endorsement of the policy of Miller Huggins, manager of the New York Yankees in suspending Babe Ruth indefinitely and fining him five thousand dollars was expressed last night by Col. Jacob Ruppert, owner of the club.
Ruth says he's through.
St. Louis, Aug. 30.—Scoring Miller Huggins, manager, for what he characterized as an attempt to shift the blame for the poor showing of the New York Yankees this season, George Herman "Babe" Ruth, baseball's premier slugger, left here to-day for Chicago, where he proposes to lay before Commissioner Landis the entire case growing out of the \$5,000 fine and indefinite suspension imposed upon him yesterday.

Ruth declared that if Huggins is to continue at the helm of the team he (Ruth) felt that he could no longer continue playing for him. Ruppert's confidence and appearing in perfect physical condition, Ruth seemed more concerned over his suspension than the unprecedented fine assessed against him.
He contended that the latest development was caused by a minor infraction of the club rules. "I came in an hour and a half late Saturday morning," Ruth said. "I had been out with some friends until midnight and then took an automobile ride because I was so warm. I arrived at the hotel at 2 1/2 o'clock. This suspension is just an attempt on the part of Huggins to shift the blame for the team's poor showing on to me. He charges me with excessive drinking. That is not true. I have never drunk so faithfully in my life as I have this year. I was out later than he allows only twice on this road trip—Saturday morning and once in Cleveland.

CATCHER COLLINS TO JOIN YANKEES

The Former St. Louis Browns Receiver Coming Back Into Big Show

St. Paul, Aug. 31.—Pat Collins, catcher on the St. Paul, American Association team, probably will play with the New York Yankees next year. Bob Connery, president of the St. Paul club, to-day announced that only formal sanction of the Yankees' business office is necessary to close the deal.

Mark Koenig, shortstop of the St. Paul club, has already been purchased by the Yanks, for future delivery, for a sum reported to be around \$55,000. Collins was not bought, but the Yanks would like to get him. He is a native of Kansas City and was with the Browns for five years. He is a right handed batter and last year in the thirty-two games he was used by St. Louis batted .315. This season Collins ranks as the class of the catchers of the South A. circuit.

Koenig can play third as well as short. Bob Connery is willing to turn Koenig over to the Yanks after September 7, when a important St. Paul-Minneapolis series is finished. Those two cities are great rivals, and at present they are practically tied, and are right at the heels of the second place Indianapolis team. Louisville has the "A. A." flag clinched, but if Owner Connery can keep his team together for a little while without relinquishing any of the stars he has sold he has a chance to cop second or third place money.
