THE LATE DONALD MONTGOMERY

We regret to have to record the death of Donald Montgomery, Esq., Superintendent of Education, which took place on Wednesday evening last. He had, it appears, been troubled with an affection of the heart for several years; yet he had not been incapacitated for duty until about a fortnight before his death. Mr. Montgomery was born at Valleyfield in 1848, and was consequently forty-two years of age. In his youth he attended such schools as were within his reach, and at the age of eighteen years he was teaching school. He afterwards attended the Prince of Wales College, where he distinguished himself as a student. After leaving the College he had charge of a school at Harrington. From this he was promoted to be head master of the Normal School. When the Davies Government came into power, he was dismissed from his position in the Normal School. He then went to Montreal and attended the law course at McGill College. When Mr. Walsh resigned his seat in the House of Assembly, the people of Bell's elected Mr. Montgomery to the Legislature. Again, at the general election in 1879, he was elected to represent that district in the House of Assembly. As a politician he took high rank, and was a vigorous and judicious speaker. In the autumn of 1879 he was appointed Deputy Minister of Education, by the Hon. Mr. Mackenzie Bowden, and he administered that portfolio for half the time of his death, upwards of ten years.
