**ACCIDENT.**—On last Friday evening at Mr. Thos. McKenzie, of the Goderich Fire Company, was assisting to hang up the hose in the tower, a portion of it slipped and fell, and the coupling striking him on the head, inflicted a scalp wound about three inches in length. Had the pin of the coupling struck him, the result might have been fatal.

**OBITUARY.**—Goderich has lost an old resident in the person of Mr. John Mitchell, grocer, who died on Tuesday, at the age of 62 years. Mr. Mitchell was well-known in this section, and for several years occupied a seat at the Town Council Board. He was father of Councilor Wm. Mitchell, and leaves a widow, four sons and two daughters to mourn his loss. He was buried on Thursday, his remains being followed to the grave by a large number of sorrowing friends.

**QUITE A GALE.**—A heavy wind storm commenced here on Sunday morning, raising white-caps on the Lake. On Monday night the wind, veering from south-west to west, attained a velocity of from 45 to 50 miles an hour. The steamer Manitoba arrived in the harbor, and remained here for over 24 hours, waiting for a moderation of the storm. The water was several feet above its usual level during the prevalence of the gale. The warning issued by the meteorological office at Toronto was timely, and fully verified.

**PERSONS.**—Early on Sunday morning two gentlemen from Clinton, Messrs. Campbell and Newton, were in town looking up some business. It appears that they were after a couple of Goderich Township farmers, named Morrow and Jenkins, who formerly lived near Clinton, and who were leaving for Uncle Sam's domain, without paying their debts. The pursuers hunted up constable Sturdy, and he bagged his game at noon across the river, when they discharged about \$92. They left by the first boat, and when other creditors, big with excitement, arrived in town, all the satisfaction they could get was to seize some small parcels of goods which the delinquents had left behind in their hurried flight.

**FALSE MEASURES.**—A Toronto milkman was recently heavily fined for infringement of the Weights and Measures Act. He had a gallon measure which held a pint and a half less than it should, but in justification he pleaded that he never measured milk with it but had had it cut down so as to fit under the seat of his wagon. The excuse was not considered sufficient, and the milkman was fined \$20 for having the false measure used \$25 for cutting it down. If any milkmen are using short measures or those which have been battered so as to reduce capacity, they had better look out, for the inspector will probably come down on them some day and catch them when they least expect it.

**RETURNED.**—Mrs. C. J. Copeland, of the Chicago House, arrived home on Saturday, bringing with her the latest New York styles. The trip was a most enjoyable one.

**LUMBER.**—The William Wallace was loaded yesterday with a cargo of lumber, shingles and lath, from the mill of Williams & Murray, for Messrs. Kallschick, of Black, Township of Hay.

**RECOVERING.**—Mr. George Cattle, who has been in poor health for some time past, had the misfortune to fall about a fortnight ago and break two of his ribs. We were glad to see him around again, on Thursday, and hear that he is now feeling somewhat better than usual.

**FOREIGN SHIPMENT.**—Messrs. Williams & Murray recently shipped six car loads of pine lumber to Baltimore, and since that time have had engineers from New York and Philadelphia. The Baltimore firm are willing to take all of that quality of lumber that our enterprising mill men can send.

**THEIR'S.**—The grape crop in Goderich is suffering to a considerable extent from the hands of the unknown in the darkness of the night. Some parties entered the property of Mr. John McLeod, of the Huron Road, on Saturday night last, and relieved the vines of about 150 pounds of this delicious fruit. We understand he has a clue to the thieves, and is about to prosecute them.

**JUDGES' COURT.**—The man Parametter, of Toronto, charged with obtaining goods from Mr. Moore, of Clinton, by fraud, was tried before His Honor, Judge Squier, on Wednesday. Parametter's son swore that at the time the goods were obtained his father had an interest in the store. On this sworn testimony, Parametter, Sr., was acquitted, but His Honor, in discharging him, stated that he was fully convinced that a gross fraud had been perpetrated on Moore by Parametter.

**IRON MINING ON MANITOULIN ISLAND.**  
The Fort William Herald says: Mr. Traunch of Goderich, the first mate of the steamer Sovereign, has fallen in for a big bonanza. Sometime ago he took up 1,000 acres of land on Manitoulin Island, in the vicinity of Killarney, and recently ascertained that there are rich beds of ore on the property. A few days ago a gentleman from Cleveland, who is possessed of considerable mining experience and plenty of money, accidentally heard of Mr. Traunch's good fortune and at once came over to Canada, and after paying the mate a handsome douceur for the privilege of getting a look at the best veins, became so thoroughly convinced of their richness that he at once offered to advance all the money required for developing and working the mines. Some of the ore has been assayed in New York and pronounced of the finest quality, and capable of being manufactured into first-class steel. Mr. Traunch, we are informed, will leave the steamer after making another trip, and he and the American gentleman will immediately engage in active mining operations. Mr. Traunch and Mr. Geo. B. Johnston, returned from a trip made since the above article was written. They brought with them some specimens of ore, which are now on exhibition in Mr. Johnston's office. It is claimed that about 60 per cent of saleable iron can be got from the ore after melting, and the gentleman interested think they have a big thing before them in the "find."
