

New York, Dec. 20-Enquiry by the coroner and the best attorney of the department, failed to throw any new light on the direct cause of the explosion yesterday in the power station of the Grand Central station which caused the death of ten persons .the injury of more than a hundred and a property damage of \$2,000,000. Dozens of witnesses were examined and every inch of ground about the scene explored but no headway was made toward fixing the blame for the disaster


