Brings Down Both Men

Policeman Kills One Assailant and Wounds the Other. Mt. Vernon, N. Y., Jan. 13 .- Shot

through the base of the spine, Robert Buffalo, a policeman, mastered paralysis to-night long enough to kill the prisoner who was escaping him, and mortally wound the prisoner's brother, who had attempted a delivery. Then he collapsed, and before he could be removed to the hospital, where he now lies critically ill, complete paralvsis set in.

Buffalo was sent to quiet a saloon fight. He arrested Artero Tiso for carrying concealed weapons. Tiso's brother, Alexander, stepped to the saloon door as Artero was led out, and fired. Buffalo stumbled and as he fell Artero broke loose and ran. But Buffalo, staggering to his feet pulled his revolver and dropped Alexander Tiso with a bullet through the

lungs, below the heart. A second shot struck Artero, who died of the wound shortly afterward. Still the instinct of duty would not let the indomitable policeman yield to growing numbness. "Here," he said,

tossing his revolver to a bystander, "don't let that fellow get away." Buffalo is 28 years old, married, and has six children. He has been on the Mt. Vernon force two years.
