OBITUARY.

MR. W. C. HAWKER.

Mr. W. C. Hawker, a venerable resident of Carbonear, passed away at his home there yesterday afternoon, in his 74th year. Deceased was born in Devonshire and came to Newfoundland when a young man and settled down at Carbonear where he later carried on business with the late Mr. John J. Atsey for a short time. When they dissolved the partnership Mr. Hawker obtained a responsible position with the well-known firm of John Rorke & Sons. In 1859 on December 22nd, Mr. Hawker was married to Miss Pearce, of Carbonear, who survives him. Two years ago the firm of Rorke & Sons presented the deceased with an address of congratulation in honour of his Golden Jubilee; he was also made a Justice of Peace on that occasion. Throughout his life Mr. Hawker was a consistent Churchman and cheerfully did what he could to help his neighbors in spiritual and temporal matters. He was a deeply religious man, and who was slow to think evil of his neighbor much less do him an injury. He was of a very cheerful disposition and helped to make the evils of life light for all with whom he had social and business relations. He will be greatly missed by all his acquaintances. He came home from Labrador last July hoping that his health would improve but Providence had willed otherwise and he gradually declined. Deceased leaves a widow and an only son, Mr. M. J. Hawker, Sergeant-at-Arms of the House of Assembly, to mourn their loss. The Telegram extends to them its sincere sympathy.

Yesterday's Football.

There was quite a number of spectators on St. George's Field yesterday afternoon to witness the match between the Methodist College boys and the Felidians. The game was well contested from start to finish, though the Methodist boys won out by a score of 3 goals to nil. The Methodist lads now have an equal number of goals with St. Bon's, and they will play off for the championship.

A Schooner's Dangerous Position.

The schr. Mary E. had a narrow escape from being lost in the storm of Friday night last. She left Island Cove, fish laden, for St. John's that evening, could not make Carbonear owing to its remoteness, and made for Kettle Cove where she arrived all right, but just here her troubles began. A terrific sea ran and two anchors were put out but one of the chains burst and it looked much as if the other would give, and if such occurred none on board would have been saved. The skipper put a flag in the rigging soliciting aid from the shore folk, and at great risk a skiff was manned and the fishermen getting off successfully, after a while got another anchor out, and when they were about to return the crew left with them. They remained ashore till about 1 a.m. Saturday, and again boarded the vessel and spent a most anxious time of it until after daylight. So close was the vessel drawn to the cliff that the back wash of the seas receding from it several times came on board. They were delighted later when the storm abated and they could get an opportunity to leave the place.

Wrestling Matches.

Mr. John Fleming, of Barter's Hill, with Mr. W. Cullen, has been painting the interior sashes of the Court House the past few days inside and outside. At 2 p.m. yesterday Fleming mounted a bookcase near Sergt. O'Leary's desk to try to pull down the sash so that he could get on the outside of the window, when he missed his footing and fell to the floor, a distance of 12 feet, the right side taking the floor with great force. He was rendered unconscious and blood flowed from his mouth and nose. Officers Keefe, Stamp and others who were in the station below heard the fall and hastened up to the man's aid. They procured Dr. Cowperthwaite who found him to be suffering from a fractured jaw with nasty injuries to the head and face. After a while he was revived and was taken to his home, Barter's Hill, in a cab accompanied by Const. Keefe. The blow seemed to have affected his brain, as when proceeding home he talked incoherently and repeatedly questioned the officer as to his (Fleming's) presence in the Court House. The work being performed by Cullen and Fleming was of a dangerous character as they had, yesterday, to stand on the sills outside to do it, and a fall would be fatal to either.
