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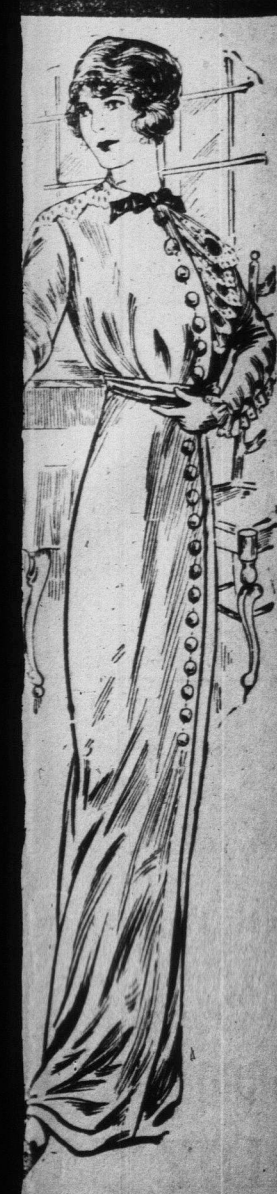

"Oh dear, how I wish we didn't have to spend so much time in sleep," said a strenuous young woman to me the other day.

"If only we didn't have to go to bed at all, what a lot more we could accomplish and how splendid it would be."

Doubtless you have heard that wish before perhaps expressed it yourself. If so, you will probably be ready to put me down as lazy or queer when I confess that it is a truly terrible thought to me.

Like almost every mortal in this overcrowded day and generation, I have often been troubled by the pressure of more life than I had time to live, and I have often wished that the days might be longer, but I certainly would not wish them longer at the expense of doing away with night and sleep.

To regard the wonderful peace of night as merely a negative day, and that marvelous thing called sleep as an unfortunate waste of time, is truly typical of the impatient utilitarianism of to-day.

All life is alternation. Everywhere in the world we find twin forces combining to make the perfect whole. Ebb and flow, day and night, seed-time and harvest, positive and negative, labor and rest, male and female. So runs the eternal systole and diastole that keep the heart of the world beating.

To cut these twin-forces in two, to

want to isolate one from the other, is to go contrary to the eternal law of life, to strike a discordant note in the harmony of the spheres.

And sleep is such a wonderful thing too! Stop and think a moment. Is there any greater comforter, any more wonderful solvent of all the aches and pains, the fears and anxieties that beset us, than sleep? We go to bed aching in every limb. We lose ourselves; we find ourselves again and lo, sleep has dissolved all the pain and weariness away and left only a delicious languor. We lie down to sleep nervous and anxious. We are sure that we can never overcome some great obstacle which looms in our pathway. We are pessimistically positive that we cannot escape some threatening misfortune. We sleep; we wake. And lo, sleep has shunk the obstacle to a plimsy size, and the probable misfortune has become a vague and distant possibility.

"Every day is a fresh beginning, every morn is the world made new," says the poet. Don't you think it would be terrible if it were otherwise; if we went on and on with never a break?

I do.

And so, when you grudge the time to-night and sleep, remember that without these things the miracle of morning would not be possible. And instead of wishing that night did not interrupt your all-important activities, remember sometimes to thank God that it exists, and that it gives you a chance to "take heart with the day and begin again."

Remarkable Case of Resuscitation.

Toronto Boy Given Up For Dead Brought Back to Life. — Rescued From Bottom of Lake by Chum in Lifeless State, Doctor and Nurses Worked Heroically With Aid of Pulmotor and After Nine Hours He Showed Signs of Revival and Two Hours Later Was Practically Himself.

Toronto June 28.—It seemed almost miraculous—a return of the dead to life. A lifeless body, which had been given up as dead the first indications of revival startled and gladdened those who were still working and hoping against hope. Then progress was rapid, and ere the vessel reached Toronto consciousness had been restored. Although extremely weak, the boy's revival was assured. There were some 1,500 passengers on the *Turbanian*, but few knew the grim battle which had been waged with death. On arrival in Toronto the *Ellis* ambulance, which had been summoned by long distance message to meet and remove what was expected to be a dead body, received rapidly reviving young patient in charge of a physician, two nurses and two maids, and took him direct to his home at 5 Van Koughnet Street.

The Hector lad, whose remarkable experience has perhaps never before been paralleled, had his leg broken some time ago, and when he dived under the water a sudden cramp set in which tied his limbs and made him powerless. For a few moments he struggled helplessly under the water, and then lost consciousness. He never rose to the surface, and remained at the bottom till the heroic efforts of young *Blenkarn* located him. *Blenkarn* had a hard struggle to raise the unconscious youth to the surface, and was much exhausted.

The Hector boy is a son of a widow, Mrs. Hector, who lives at 5 Van Koughnet Street with two younger sons. When interviewed at her home at 1 o'clock this morning she stated that the boy was resting quietly and Dr. Eby, the family physician, is in attendance. The pastor and Sunday school teacher of the lad followed him to his home and spent a portion of the night with him. The boy, who was the only member of the family at the picnic, was sleeping when the *Globe* representative went to his room to see him. Although still weak, he is apparently now quite out of danger.

A Record Voyage.

A record transpacific voyage of nine days five hours has been made by the new Canadian Pacific liner, "Empress of Russia," which arrived at Victoria, British Columbia, from Yokohama, a 4,290 mile journey, on Saturday. The previous best was ten days ten hours.
