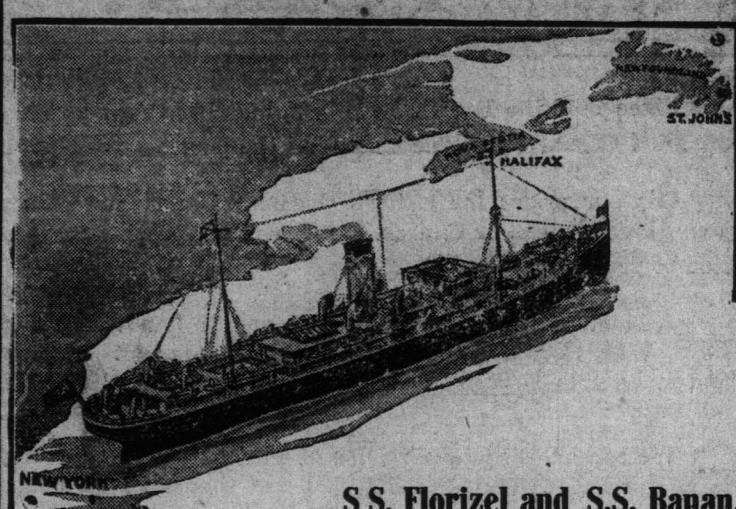

BREMEN LOST.

WASHINGTON, To-day. The loss of the German submarine merchantship Bremen is virtually conceded to-day by ranking Teutonic diplomats, in a position to be familiar with the movements of the vessel. The Bremen is now a month overdue.

BERLIN CLAIMS GAIN.

BERLIN, To-day. German troops took the offensive yesterday in Volhynia and captured Russian trenches on the west bank of the Stokhod, it was announced officially to-day. Russian attacks near Buk now were repulsed with heavy losses.

GERMANS ADMIT BREMEN GONE.

WASHINGTON, To-day. It was admitted by German officials not only in this country but in Berlin that they were without any information of the fate of the Bremen. She should have arrived at an American port soon after the middle of last month, after the departure of the Bremen from Germany to the U.S. It was stated one would reach an American port some time within the next month. The Bremen was commanded by Capt. Schwarzkopf and carried a crew of 35 men.

WITH THE VOLUNTEERS.—The volunteers were engaged at Swedish back their adversaries who are leaving prisoners and guns in the hands of the Roumanians. Berlin, however, controverts this statement by the assertion that the Austro-Germans are still engaged in fighting in the mountain passes. Generally speaking there is no change in the situation in Macedonia, although both the Entente and Teutonic Allies claim minor successes in various sectors. The Bulgarians in the vicinity of Monastir, are bringing up reinforcements and a large number of trench mortars. Except on Mont Pasubio in the Trentino region, where the Austrians in violent attacks recaptured the positions taken on Tuesday by the Italians only to be driven out again, artillery duels are taking place in the Austro-Italian theatre.

FINE GAINS BY SERBIANS.

LONDON, To-day. After desperate fighting the Serbians have captured the Village of Brod in Macedonia, the heights to the north of that place and the Village of Velesele, and are pursuing the Bulgarians northward, according to a Reuter despatch from Salonika. On the remainder of that front there is heavy fighting in favor of the Serbs, who have captured since Sept. 14th 43 guns, not including trench guns. By the capture of Brod and Velesele, the despatch adds, the Serbians have pierced the Bulgarian second line and are now confronted by a third line on the western slope of Moravova Range, which brings them appreciably nearer Monastir.

THE ICE-CREAM SUNDAE.

The ice-cream sundae is an intricate beverage which has a very cooling effect when applied in rapid succession. By the time a heated and careworn tourist has lapped down in a drugstore and consumed five or six ice-cream sundaes at a rate of speed that would win the 2:05 pace, he will be entirely cooled off and fit to cope with the roadside puncture without melting away while doing the coping.

The sundae is an improvement over the old-fashioned cornstarch ice-cream that used to be served on the

church lawn. A few years ago you could not go anywhere in this broad land without running into the sallow complexion of plain vanilla ice-cream with a lingering, prehensile flavour. It was in order to render this flavour null and void that the sundae was invented, and as a result nobody eats plain ice-cream any more except to appease an outraged stomach.

The sundae is a mixed drink and consists of ice-cream smothered in everything but young onions. Owing to the prohibition have thousands of skilful bartenders have been thrown out of employment, but most of them

have since been hired to manufacture the ice-cream sundae in long, wriggling relays. Every few days some former barkeep will bring out a new

stimulating business and creating a widespread demand for some time-tried dyspepsia cure.

The ice-cream sundae has robbed the drugstore business of most of its profits. There was a time when a small, furtive dish of semi-frozen ice-cream could be served without any expensive trimmings and yield about 250 per cent. on the investment. Now, however, people demand a delicious concoction loaded with every kind of fruit from the eggplant to the English walnut, including the shell, and expect the proprietor to throw in ice-water, a paper napkin and the sextette from "Lucia." This explains why there are so many drugstores in prohibition territory for sale.

Add a teaspoonful of cornstarch to each cup of sugar, when making chocolate fudge, and it will surely be smooth.
