### Our Representative.

Dr. Lloyd, the Prime Minister of this Dominion, has again crossed to the other side, this time to represent Newfoundland at the Peace Conference which will shortly be held in one of the Allied capitals.

Whilst Newfoundland appreciates highly the honor being done her in having her Prime Minister sitting at the peace table, side by side with the Premiers of sister Dominions, and the principal statesmen of Europe and America, and in participating in all the discussions preliminary to and following the final settlement, yet there is an opinion abroad that a much more capable and experienced exponent of statecraft than our present Premier by accident, should have been delegated to this important mission. No stretch of the imagination can make Dr. Lloyd Premier by and with the consent of the people of Newfoundland. He does not even represent the will of the electorate, nor has he received the title of first minister by popular mandate. He is simply a created Premier, made by a few men who arrogated to themselves the rights of Government, and who have usurped power unscrupulously and unashamedly to suit their own political purposes. Dr. Lloyd might be their Premier, but he is not, by right of election, Prime Minister of Newfoundland. Neither he nor the individuals associated with him have the confidence of the electorate, and his mission to England, consequently is not with the full concurrence of the people. Moreover in a time, such as the present, when Newfoundland is being taken into the inner Councils of the Empire, it would be more fitting and appropriate to have for our Imperial representative, a Newfoundland-born and bred, one with full power and authority conferred on him by the properly accredited representatives of the people, not a make shift Premier possessed of few qualifications and ignorant of the first principles of statesmanship, a Premier foisted upon the Dominion to suit the exigencies of purely partisan politics and policies, and the advancement of discredited politicians.

To our mind, the one man for the job, and the only one qualified in every way to represent Newfoundland at the approaching Peace Conference, was Sir Robert Bond. The Government had that one chance to show that its claims of disinterested zeal in the welfare of the Dominion, had more than sand for their foundation. It had, and still has, if it likes to exercise the power, through the Government, the chance of inviting Sir Robert Bond to be our representative at that peace board. Sir Robert's statesmanship is world-famed, and in thus honoring him the Government (?) would be doing honor to the Imperial authorities, no less than to themselves. With the present representative sitting at the Conference, the part played by Newfoundland in its deliberations, will in nowise be worthy of the part played by her in the conflict now ceased. We are being represented not by incompetence, a calamity doubly regrettable because needless. It is not yet too late to redeem our reputation and future by appointing as our representative the one man whose presence would not fail to add lustre to the distinguished gathering which will decide the fate of Germany, and whose qualifications and ability are undoubted. The "man for the job" is decidedly SIR ROBERT BOND, and in more ways than one.

### NAVAL CELEBRATION.

LONDON, Nov. 13. (Via Reuter's)—A marvelous night scene was witnessed off the Scottish Coast, when the Grand Fleet celebrated the armistice. On a thirty mile line, warships, of every description, were simultaneously illuminated. Myriads of searchlights, creating an awesome sound. Hundreds of searchlights played fantastically. Fire works and star shells were lighted. The celebrations, after lasting an hour, ceased as suddenly as they began.

### QUESTIONS IN COMMONS.

LONDON, Nov. 13. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency).—In the House of Commons, Mr. Denman asked whether passports could now be granted to women desiring to go to Canada to be married. Right Hon. T. J. McNamara replied that the whole question of restriction upon travelling at sea would shortly be under the consideration of the Government. Replying to Viscount Wolmer, Surgeon W. G. Macpherson stated that in October, nearly twenty-five thousand British soldiers in France were in hospital owing to influenza, of this number 421 died, 2,700 were in hospital with pneumonia, of whom over 1,000 died.

### WANT REPRESENTATION.

LONDON, Nov. 13. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency).—At the meeting in Bombay, of the European Association, a resolution was passed expressing apprehension at the denial of representatives to the non-official European community, under the Indian Reform scheme, and asserting the right of the community to such representation, in view of the important interests it held in India.

### FOR LEAGUE OF NATIONS.

LONDON, Nov. 13. Premier Lloyd George in discussing the question of a league of nations said that such a league was more necessary now than ever. He pointed out that the conditions which prevailed in the Balkans before the war were now affecting practically two-thirds of Europe. A large number of small nations have been reborn in Europe, he continued, "and these will require a league of nations to protect them against the covetousness of ambitious and grasping nations. In my judgment a league of nations is absolutely essential to permanent peace. We shall go into the peace conference to guarantee that a league of nations is a reality. I am one of those who believe that without peace we cannot have progress. A league of nations guarantees peace and guarantees also an all round reduction of armaments, and that reduction of armaments is a guarantee that you can get rid of conscription here. Of course we must have in this country an efficient army to police the Empire but I am looking forward to a condition of things with the existence of a league of nations under which conscription will not be necessary in any country."

### LOSS OF "AUDACIOUS."

London Nov. 14. News of the sinking of the Audacious, first officially announced to-day, was published in the United States shortly after the disaster. The British press printed an account of the loss about two months later but the Government withheld confirmation. After striking the mine the battleship remained afloat for twelve hours, during which practically the entire crew of 800 men were rescued by the White Star Line Olympic. Then a terrific explosion took place on the Audacious and she sank. The ship was later reported raised and repaired.

### SUBMARINES TO INTERVENE.

LONDON, Nov. 13. Five German submarines arrived at Landskrona, Southern Sweden, Wednesday and requested the naval authorities to intern them, according to

a despatch to the Exchange Telegraph from Copenhagen. The submarines commanders said they did not dare return to Germany.

### MORE ABDICATIONS.

BASEL, Switzerland, Nov. 13. A despatch from Berlin says Grand Duke William Ernest of Saxe-Weimar has abdicated in order to prevent civil war. The despatch adds that Republics have been proclaimed in Wurttemberg and Hesse. The new government in Baden has been constituted under the presidency of the Socialist, Herr Jellie. The former Grand Duke William Ernest is 42 years old. Saxe-Weimar is in Central Germany. Among the important towns in the Grand Duchy are Weimar, which is the capital and Jena, the famous university town.

### LATEST OF CROWN PRINCE.

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 13. The former Crown Prince is with his troops at the front, according to a despatch from the senior official of the Bureau of Berlin, received here. [During the past few days he has been reported as with his father in Holland, as having fled from Liege, as having been shot by his troops, and as having succeeded.]

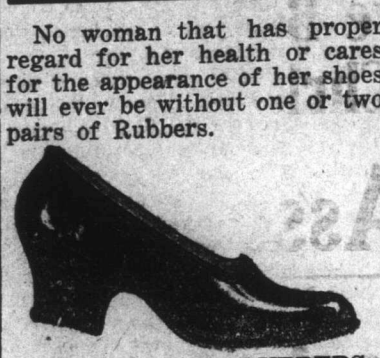

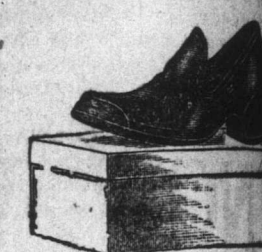
