Extraordinarily High Tide.

WATER FLOODING WATERFRONT
WHARVES, CAUSE DAMAGE.
HIGHEST IN FORTY YEARS.

What was described by Hon. Tasker
Cook, for many years connected with
shipping and a constant visitor to the
waterfront, as "the highest tide in
forty years," was in evidence along
the harbor's edge this morning for
about three hours or so.

At Baine Johnston's Wharf, for ex-
ample, the water rose above the
wharf and, continuing to rise, came
up the cove to the upper corner of
the wholesale store, leaving the bot-
tom step of the stairs leading to the
office under water. The rise was one
of about three feet and a half, com-
ing about a foot above the wharf.
About 100 casks of fish, which were
lying on the wharf at the time, were
caught by the rising tide and for a
time were floating about. When the
tide went back, however, they were
left stranded. Their contents are sup-
posed to have been badly damaged.
The casks of fish were owned by Hon.
P. Templeman.

At Bowring's wharf, McDougall's,
Bishop's and right up the harbor the
same thing happened. On the South
Side the schooner Jubilee, owned by
Mr. Frank Moore of Carbonar, was
pounded against the fishstages and
flakes of Mr. John Ryan, damaging
them considerably.

Several vessels, anchored up-stream
dragged anchor last night and were
blown down the harbor. The vessels
Admiral Drake, Lady St. John's and
a couple of others became entangled
when their chains interwound, and
they will not be able to be cleared be-
fore the tide goes down.

At the City Hall.

The Municipal Council held its reg-
ular weekly meeting last evening.
The Mayor presided, and Councillors
Mullaly and Ayre attended. After the
reading of minutes, etc., the following
matters were discussed.

The Prime Minister wrote in con-
nection with the transfer of the prop-
erty on Quidi Vidi Road that he had
referred the matter to the Minister
of Mines and Agriculture for atten-
tion.

The Deputy Colonial Secretary
wrote that he would bring Council's
letter re matters of finance, to the
attention of the Executive Council.

The Minister of Justice wrote that
he was giving attention to the points
raised by the Council in connection
with the telephone contract.

A light in Convent Lane, asked for
by the residents, was allowed to stand
over for the present.

Several applications were received
for the position of Junior Clerk. Those
stood over for enquiry and decision at
a special meeting Saturday.

Applications received for the pur-
chase of the houses on Quidi Vidi Rd.,
were ordered to be filed in the mean-
time.

The Solicitor reported on the rights
of the Council in connection with the
control of the Parade Ground. It was
decided that the application of the
Newfoundland Highlanders for a site
to build their Armoury on this ground
could not be acceded to.

The City Engineer reported on the
need of a light on Cook Street. This
was granted.

It was decided to take legal pro-
ceedings, after ten days' notice,
against parties who have not paid the
amounts assessed against them for
the laying of the water and sewerage
along in front of their properties.

The City Engineer reported on work
of the several departments of the city
under his control during the past
week.

A list of lights out in the city dur-
ing the past week was ordered to be
referred to the authorities for atten-
tion.

The Health Officer and Sanitary
Supervisor submitted their weekly re-
ports.

After disposing of some routine busi-
ness and passing of pay rolls and
bills, the meeting adjourned.

This Morning's Fire.

The Central fire brigade was called to
the residence of Mr. Will Ryan, as-
sistant-city engineer, Newtown Road,
this morning, a slight fire having
broken out there. Mr. Ryan was thaw-
ing out a water pipe and the flame
ignited the wall between the studding
and the pipe. No damage was done.

Would Pay But Couldn't.

Last night an outport man, who
could comfortably afford to pay for
board but was unable to find shelter,
had to apply at the Police Station.
There he was welcomed and given
the necessary shelter by the Guard.
The outport man was financially in-
dependent, having several thousand
dollars represented on his person by
cheques, notes and bank-book.

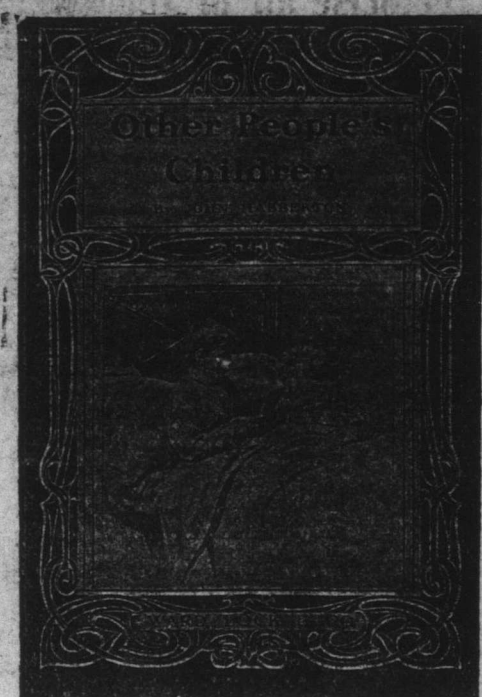
