NFLD. BARRISTER ON HONEYMOON TRIP.

Mr. Charles Hunt, of the St. John's Nfld. legal firm of Higgins, Hunt and Emerson, was a passenger leaving by this morning's express. He was accompanied by his wife. Mr. and Mrs. Hunt are on a honeymoon trip to Upper Canadian and American cities.

Mr. Pittman, perhaps one of the greatest live wire officials of his kind, and a general favorite with the travelling public, is making the round trip, but may remain here until Thursday.

STRANDED NEWFOUNDLANDERS.

According to stories told by several groups of hardy young Newfoundlanders who kept acting Immigration Officer Mitchell, working overtime yesterday, the labor market in Cape Breton is pretty well glutted. In all there were about twenty applicants who pleaded with Mr. Mitchell for deportation back to the ancient colony. Some of them are married men with families at home, who told of only coming to North Sydney about a week ago to seek employment in the Cape Breton collieries or at any work, even at any price, but were unsuccessful. Asked why they left Newfoundland they said conditions were unbearable, but they would rather starve among their own people than among strangers. In some cases the applicants admitted to the Immigration official that they misrepresented the facts when passing through, so anxious were they to obtain work in this country. The men will be sent back on the steamer Kyle tonight.

We have just been shown a Testimonial awarded by The Royal Humane Society, to Jack, son of Dr. F. Fisher, which reads as follows: "At a meeting of the Committee of the Royal Humane Society held at their office, Trafalgar Square, on the 8th day of March, 1921, it was resolved unanimously: "That John W. A. Fisher is justly entitled to the Honorary Testimonial of this Society inscribed on Vellum, which is hereby awarded him for having on the 26th August, 1920, gone to the rescue of Grace Fisher, who was in imminent danger of drowning in the Humber River, Newfoundland, and whose life he gallantly saved."

The document bears the autograph of H.R.H. the Prince of Wales as President and is one of which Jack and his friends may well feel proud. It is accompanied by a letter from His Excellency the Governor, expressing his congratulations to Jack on receiving this award.

Blue-Bead a Potent Charm.

According to Melville Chater, who is on a tour of inspection for the Near East Relief, madness is still regarded by Turks, Armenians and other as evidence of the presence of an evil spirit, and exorcisms and darkness are the means taken to drive him away.

In a little village of Greek population, near Tala, where Mr. Chater and a party of relief workers were being entertained, "the Greek Bishop, Nicholas," writes Mr. Chater, "showing us some dungeon-like vaults under the chapel, in which vaults the early Christians held service during periods of persecution. These pitch-black vaults are now employed by neighboring Turks as a lunatic asylum."

"When an evil spirit enters into some one he or she is let down through a barred grating into the vaults and loaded with heavy chains, which I saw there. The devil is thus exorcised by pitch darkness, chains, bread and water diet and prayers until the situation becomes too uncomfortable for him and he forsakes the affected person."

"The Bishop assured me that this unholy, unscientific and unsanitary method of dealing with temporarily deranged persons is still in force, and strange as it may seem, the mental disturbance is often cleared up in twenty-four hours."

These superstitions are not confined to the Turks, however. Among the Armenians in the rural districts the Near East relief workers find that a blue bead is regarded as more efficacious in warding off the "evil one" than all the normal and sane precautions in the world. Even the animals are decorated with this symbol of good luck.
