COAKER'S MEETING IN GREENSPOND WENT IN FAVOUR OF MONROE PARTY.

GREENSPOND, May 24.—Coaker candidates arrived last evening. Flags flew from fourteen poles only. The meeting opened with the Union Secretary as Chairman. Forbes first speaker and apologized for the election. Blamed it on Higgins, Walsh and Sullivan. He then left the hall. Stick next spoke for fifteen minutes on ex-soldiers. We are sorry there were none in the hall as all have been driven from place and country by Coakerism. Dr. Barnes spoke on economy and all the money spent on returned soldiers on several occasions, mentioning those who had fallen in France and Flanders. This caused fathers to leave the hall until ex-Reservist Capt. Frank Green advised him to stick to politics and let the dead rest. He then referred to several amounts of expenditure chiefly on Normal School. At the close of his speech his figures were questioned by our Chairman, and his reply was that they were figurative. Capt. Frank Green asked for platform which was granted and as he proceeded there was loudly cheered. He replied to several assertions made by Stick and Barnes and asked the latter why he was so much interested in Bonavista Bay fishermen now, when only two years ago he was strongly opposed to the removal of Export Tax on fish and also several other questions which completely floored him. Capt. Green took his seat amidst thunderous applause. Meeting closed with ringing cheers for Monroe and Clean Government.


