

HANDBOOKS GAIN BY AUTO PHONES

Detectives Say It Is Impossible for Police to Locate Gambling Under New System

"Only Dubs in Game Are Using Chicago Telephone Wire," He Asserts

Chicago, July 16.—Handbook gambling in Chicago is rapidly increasing. That is admitted by the detectives who are assigned to its suppression. The detectives assert that the use of the automatic telephone makes it practically impossible for them to locate gambling places by listening on the wire. In addition, the detectives assert that the Illinois Tunnel company, which operates the automatic system, gives no assistance while the Chicago Telephone company is credited with giving information frequently.

The latter corporation often telephones the police department when they are asked to place a telephone in a location asking if the police have any objections. The sleuths assert they have never received that sort of information from the Illinois Tunnel company.

Remove Automatic Phones "To the last money dabbler" said one of the subordinates of Sergeant Stoler and Eichenbaum, in charge of the gambling squad, "we have removed about forty phones. Half of them have been automatics. I believe that if we could locate the automatic phones as easily as we can the manually operated phones, we would have had two or three times as many automatics out as we have obtained. The man with the set gets on the automatic lines and the ticks, which indicate the number of the phone called, come so fast that he cannot count them."

Gamblers Make Escape "All the wise gamblers are using the automatic phones. Only the dubs are using the lines of the Chicago Telephone company. Take O'Leary. We got an automatic from his place a few days ago. While we were trying to trace the line thirty fellows escaped from the blacksmith shop back on Thirty-ninth street, near Vernon avenue, had an automatic.

While the detective was talking tip walked Policemen Frommick and Johnson with an automatic phone, which they said they had taken from the basement at 135 West South Water street. The keeper, who gave his name as Charles Robinson, and seven inmates were arrested.

Get No Help From Company "A couple of years ago we were ordered to confiscate phones used for gambling. We did. I have helped smash dozens of them. Now that is all changed. We carefully preserve the instrument, bring it to the office and the telephone company calls for it. Of course, I don't know what they do with it, but it's a good guess that some of these are put in for gamblers at other places. I don't mind letting the companies have their phones back if they were helping us catch the gamblers. But the automatic people don't help us in any way."

It has been reported around in the department that the automatic company stands in with the administration, so there are some things I can't tell you without letting them know who is giving out the information.

"I have been wondering whether they will count the gamblers as bona fide subscribers in that investigation. Prof. Bemis is making a list of the number of subscribers. I don't know whether this is true or not, but it has been gossiped around that the company is putting in phones for the gamblers last year insisted upon getting their pay in advance. The police would be glad to trace down some of those who have paid in advance. For we might find some gamblers at the other end."
