

One child contracted diptheria, and in a few days the disease was com-municated to 50 pupils. The state board of health ordered the pencils destroyed and the system abolished. The deceased was a native of Scotland and came to Dunwich fifty years ago, and had resided in the township ever since. He is survived by one daughter and two sons, Mrs. McKel-lar, Ekfrid, and John and Andrew, in Manitoba.

Manitoba. A humorous story comes from the Lesser Slave lake country. In a re-mote section all of the people have moved out of a school district except-ing one family. The father and two sons elected themselves as directors and emyloyed the mother, who holds a certificate, to teach. LOCAL OPTION.

Local option was voted on in 62 mu-nicipalities in Ootario. Out of 53 places heard from, 43 have given good majorities in favor of the by-laws, in-cluding the city of Owen Sound, the first city in Ontario to accept local option. Of the near-by municipalities Petrolea defeated the measure by 2 to 1, and Euphemia, Enniskillen, East Nissouri, Arkona and Warwick car-ried it.

Died in Minnesota. We have this week to announce the death of Mrs. Eliza Ann Hooper, which took place at Anoka, Minn., on December 18th, 1905. Deceased was the eldest daughter of the late John Campbell and Jane Elliott and was born ou lot 7, south of the Longwoods road, Ekfrid, on November 29th, 1825. She married Thomas Wheelon on Dec. 6th, 1848, and for a time resided in the gore. Ekfrid. Later she and her bus-band moved to Minnesota, where Mr. Wheelon afterwards died.
