The October crop report gives the total yield of wheat as 23,670,409 bushels. The average per acre is 16.58 bushels in the southern counties, 16.35 bushels in the central, 14.02 in the northern and 16.48 bushels in the State. The average yield per acre was nearly one-fourth of a bushel greater than the annual average for the last ten years. Oats in the southern counties yield 25.61 bushels, in the central 30.06 bushels, and in the northern 18.92 bushels. The corresponding figures one year ago were 31.97, 33.20 and 21.06. Barley in the southern counties yield 19.45 bushels, and in the State 18.76 bushels per acre. Corn is estimated to yield 50 bushels of ears per acre in the southern counties, 60 in the central and 62 in the northern, the average for the State being 53 bushels. Potatoes in the southern counties will yield one-half of an average crop, in the central counties 58 per cent., and in the northern 90 per cent of an average crop. The average for the State is 58. The estimates for winter applies are 23 per cent. in the southern counties, 36 in the central, and 27 per cent. for the State, comparison being with an average crop.


