Incendiarism Fails to Cover Up the Deed-A Wife's Terrible Story.

BINGHAMTON, N. Y., Nov. 7.—At West Windsor, about twenty miles east of Binghamton, last Friday night, the barn of Richard Foote, a farmer, was burned to the ground. While searching in the ruins the neighbors came upon the charred remains of a human body. Coins found near it were identified as pocket pieces which Foote had carried on his person. Mrs. Foote went out and saw her husband's bleeding body lying in the stall. He was dead, and his head had been battered out of all semblance to humanity. Furman afterwards went away, but returned Friday and set fire to the barn to destroy the evidence of the crime. Foote was a man of middle age and Mrs. Foote was his second wife. The differences in their ages was the cause of dissatisfaction on the part of the wife, and she encouraged the attention of Furman, who is described as a worthless fellow. 
