

VOTERS' LISTS FOR NEXT ELEC-

During the session of 1894 the Ontario Legislature passed an act known as the "City Manhood Suffrage Act," providing for the registration of manhood suffrage voters in cities after the announcement of the general election. During a subsequent session an act was passed extending the provisions of the act of 1894 to all county towns in the province. Manhood registration immediately previous to the next provincial general election will therefore be held in all the cities and county towns in Ontario. The work of revising the voters' lists in all other muni-cipalities (including towns that are not county towns) is now in progress, and the lists should be made as complete as possible. The work in towns that are not county towns, villages and townships should be attended to at once, for only in cities and county towns will registration take place after the announcement of the election. grading Habit. Self-pity is the most elusive and deceptive form of selfishness; it be-guiles the most acute mind which yields to it, and disintegrates the clearest judgment if it becomes a habit. It is a kind of sentimentalism which finds its food in our vanity and grows by what it feeds on. It seems like a con where paid to him. Sir W. Laurier was solation for our mistakes and misfortunes, but it really is an anodyne which protects us from a pain that is ssential to health. When we blunder and fail, we ought to suffer, since suffering puts us on a road to a recovery of what we have lost, or to the uest of that which we have not had the strength to grasp. What we need is the tonic of a relentlessly honest lealing with ourselves. If we have been weak, small, mean, we want to know our defects and call them by ames that accurately describe them If we have not secured the approbation we crave, we ought, for charity's sake, frankly, fully, and squarely to the approbation because we have not done the work that would have won it If we deal with ourselves in this spirit we pay ourselves the highest respect, and put ourselves in the way of being worthy of it. But too many of us do nothing of the kind.
