Fall of Fort Maude!

Hordes of Rebels Swarm Through Khyber Pass.

The Situation in India Is of the Gravest Character.

Newspapers Attribute It to Salisbury's Bad Diplomacy.

How Two Forts Fell into Hostile Hands.

The Scene of the Rising—Strength of the British Force.

London, Aug. 24.—It is admitted, even in official circles, that the news from India is of the gravest character. The Afghans only form a part of the insurgents the British must put down. A letter from India, published in the Standard, emphasizes the belief that the Sultan of Turkey is at the back of the whole uprising. The writer says: "The average Mohammedan, even in British India, cannot distinguish between the Greek and the other European nationalities. To him the Christians of Europe are all one people, and when he hears that the Sultan has been at war with the Christians, whom he has utterly defeated, he understands that this means an English defeat, and exults accordingly." The afternoon papers today comment severely upon SALISBURY'S BAD DIPLOMACY. The St. James Gazette says: "The moral of the whole story is that we, who have 50,000 Mohammedans in our eastern empire, have chosen to present ourselves to all the world as the chief enemy of the sultan, whom the vast majority of men of that creed look upon as their head in religious matters. If we had succeeded in inspiring real terror, the harm done might have been less, but what fear can be felt for a power which, after warnings, is pulled up short, by orders from St. Petersburg?"

THE SCENE OF THE TROUBLE.

The scene of the rising has the Khyber Pass for the center. The plan of the British commander is to draw the insurgents to the vicinity of the road, which is strongly fortified, close to the Indian mouth of the pass, having Peshawar and Kohat for bases, and where the British number about 11,000 men. The policy of the Afghans is to tempt the British into the hills and spurs of the pass. Fort Maude is a small stone fort overlooking the road four miles up the pass from Jamrud. Fort Ali-Musjed is about half mile further up. There the pass is 40 yards wide.

THE CAPTURE OF FORT MAUDE.

Later details of the capture of Fort Maude show that the garrison of that place retired at 10.30 p.m. Monday, and that the fort was burned at 11 o'clock the same night. The garrison reached Col. Westmacott's relief column coming from Kohat, at 11.30 p.m. At the same time that Fort Maude was abandoned, the Khyber Rifles, garrisoning Fort Jevangera, were compelled to abandon that place. The area of the active fighting is enlarging rapidly. The Afghans, on Monday evening, attacked with great determination, the fortified post of Sudatta, but were not successful in capturing it. Parochinar was attacked yesterday. There are two English villages with the garrison at Parochinar.

STRENGTH OF THE BRITISH.

The British military authorities have now mobilized 32,000 men for frontier operations, with the frontier garrisons, makes 42,000 men available for use against the insurgents.

SAFE IN THE HILLS.

London, Aug. 25.—A dispatch to the Times from Simla, dated Tuesday evening, says: "The British have ventured upon active hostilities today, but have remained in the hills about Kohat, where, for the present, they are practically safe from attack. They had the audacity to suggest the terms under which they would agree to disperse to their homes. The British have withdrawn all our troops from Swat and from the Samana range, the surrender of all the British women living within our borders, and the revulsion of the salt regulations."

RUMORS OF DISASTER.

London, Aug. 25.—A special dispatch from Bombay says that there is an unconfirmed rumor in circulation that the Afghans have attacked Fort Ali-Musjed with great determination. The garrison made a sortie in full force, endeavoring to disperse them, but not without a desperate resistance, and lost 300 killed. The remainder of the garrison then abandoned the post, and made its way to the station on the Lahore line.

The rumor lacks confirmation. The garrison was composed of Afghans, with Afghans, if, as one report says, they died fighting desperately. It may be regarded as proof of the continued loyalty of the Afghans in the Indian army.

The attack on Fort Ali-Musjed was led by Mir Bashir of Tirah on the high plateau, which is the summer headquarters of the Afghans and the Orukzais. Mir Bashir is a well known frontier chief. In 1890, during a period of similar discontent, he was wounded himself King of Tirah, and began to

Two Sisters Drowned While Bathing.

Halifax, N. S., Aug. 24.—Two young ladies named Brown, aged 16 and 17, daughters of Benjamin Brown, were drowned in the northwest arm of the harbor while bathing. Their mother made a heroic effort to save them. She got one ashore alive, but she died shortly afterwards.
BOY CUT TO PIECES.
Winnipeg, Aug. 25.—A 9-year-old boy, the son of Wm. Veary, a farmer near Deleau, Man., was playing in a field of wheat, when he was overtaken by a binder and cut to pieces. Both legs were taken off. While physicians were operating the boy died.
DEAD BABY.
Ottawa, Aug. 25.—A male child about four days old was found dead at the side of the road in Clarkstown on Monday night. The discovery was made by Mrs. Felix Gagne, of Chapel street. Wrapped up in the clothes of the infant was a small piece of paper, bearing words which seemed to be "I am in danger," which means that the child was in danger.

RAILROAD IN THE DESERT.

Water Was the Problem and It Has Been Found by Digging Wells.

London, Aug. 25.—A dispatch from Wady Halfa says that the Arabs were hugely surprised by the wells that have been sunk in the desert by the engineers who are constructing the railroad across the big bend in the Nile from Korosko to Hu Hamed. They are convinced that the discovery of water in these places is proof that there is a subterranean passage to the Nile. Chief Abdul Azim, who is acquainted with every inch of the Nubian desert, declares that the discovery of water will revolutionize travel there, and predicts that villages will spring up in the heart of the desert. Three thousand men are employed in building the railroad, many of them being derwishes who were captured by the Anglo-Egyptian forces. They work like Trojans. They display a most cheerful disposition, and are continually laughing like children. One day the further the laborers seemed to be laying the track by a beautiful lake lying amid wooded hills. Cascades, and boats could be plainly seen. By using field glasses the illusion is intensified.

THE BRITISH SCIENTISTS.

Read and Discuss Papers on a Variety of Subjects.

Toronto, Aug. 25.—The various sections of the British Association met against yesterday, when many papers were read.
In the anthropological section Prof. George H. of Montreal, read a paper for speaking of the progress of his researches. He said that the revolution which has followed its subjugation may be compared with that following the first kindling of fire. In the combined meeting of the economic and geographical sections, Mr. F. C. Selous, the well-known explorer, read a paper on "The economic geography of Rhodesia." It was a careful description of the country, with special reference to the possibilities of settlement by whites. He claimed that the highlands of Rhodesia were such a country, and thought that the British nation owed a debt of gratitude to Mr. Cecil Rhodes whose far-seeing statesmanship the acquisition of that territory was entirely due. "Had it not been for Rhodes," continued the speaker, "I firmly believe that the Germans would now be in possession of Rhodesia." Right Hon. James Bryce spoke in praise of Mr. Selous' paper. He said that he looked forward to the confederation of the South African states, which, despite the present political conditions, he asserted, will ultimately come, and expressed the conviction that the love and patriotism of the citizens would not be incompatible with their loyalty to the flag of the mother country.

THE PORTER'S LATEST PROPOSAL.

Constantinople, Aug. 24.—The Turkish Government now proposes that the Sultan's troops shall occupy Yala and Larissa and the country in the rear of these places until the Greek war indemnity is paid, immediately withdrawing the troops south of the line on the signing of the treaty of peace. The Marquis of Salisbury, however, maintains his opposition to the Turkish proposal.

THE PARIS HOLOCAUST RECALLED.

Paris, Aug. 25.—Baron MacKau, one of the chief promoters of the charity bazaar, destroyed by fire on May 4 last, with a loss of over 100 lives, has been sentenced to pay a fine of 500 francs. CAUSED BY A CINEMATOGRAPE.

Paris, Aug. 25.—The cinematographe, which caused the recent fatal fire at the Grand Bazar de Charite, was yesterday occupied by the land exister, which occurred at the Parisiana, a music hall. As soon as the spectators saw the flames, they began to panic-stricken, and rushed for the street. A number of women were so badly frightened that they fainted. The firemen arrived promptly and quenched the flames. Some persons were injured in the rush, but none of them seriously. The fire did little damage.

AGAINST BRITAIN.

London, Aug. 25.—The tendency of the continental powers to array themselves against Great Britain has grown much stronger and more aggressive recently. There is good reason to believe that the French are now arraying themselves against Great Britain. This fact and Emperor William's visit to St. Petersburg. Both the Russian and German press have during the past few days, the English newspapers are beginning to retaliate, and the language on both sides is now ugly and bellicose. It is solemnly reported on the continent that an alliance of the two alliances, the British and the German, has been agreed upon, for anti-English purposes.

QUEER COFFIN STORY.

Liverpool, Aug. 25.—The British steamer Niger has arrived here from the Island of Fernando Po, on the west coast of Africa, where is situated one of the Spanish penal colonies. She reports that the Cuban and Philippine exiles were dying so rapidly that coffins could not be obtained in which to bury them.
