WITHOUT ANY CASUALTIES!

Plumer Occupies Nylstroom and French Has Scooped a Lot of Prisoners.

Reported Union of the Forces Under Dewet and Botha—Boers Make Their Reappearance in Cape Colony—Baden-Powell at Cape Town.

London, April 2.—Under date of Pretoria, April 1, Lord Kitchener reports to the war office as follows:
"Plumer has occupied Nylstroom and French has captured three guns on the lower Pongola. Thirty-one prisoners have been captured in the Orange River Colony. There were no casualties."

It is reported from Vryheid that as a result of General French's recent operations, the Boers are retiring eastward, hard pressed by Col. Dartnell, of the Natal police, and Col. Alderson. Some of them endeavored to break away to the north, but were headed off by Col. Allenby, who captured a 15-pounder and two pom-poms.

AT PRETORIA.
Pretoria, April 1.—A considerable number of Boer refugees, men, women and children, continue to flock into the city daily from the outlying districts. They are being sent to the detention camp at Irene.

Cape Town, April 1.—Gen. Baden-Powell has arrived here.

GERMANY'S POLICY.

The Berliner Tageblatt publishes the following dispatch from Shanghai: "The German first-class battleship Weissenburg has started from Shanghai toward Nankin and the north, her purpose being to impress the Chinese and the allies that Germany means to preserve and heighten her prestige and interests in the Yang Tse Valley. The German gunboat 'Tiger' has relieved the Illus at Hankau, where the allies are for months, because of the shallowness of the Yang Tse at that point."

RUSSIAN REPORTS.

A dispatch to the Cologne Gazette, from St. Petersburg, dated April 1, says: "The German first-class battleship Weissenburg has started from Shanghai toward Nankin and the north, her purpose being to impress the Chinese and the allies that Germany means to preserve and heighten her prestige and interests in the Yang Tse Valley. The German gunboat 'Tiger' has relieved the Illus at Hankau, where the allies are for months, because of the shallowness of the Yang Tse at that point."

Missionaries have reported to the United States legation that they have received reliable information that a German expedition from Shanghai, 3,000 strong, has reached Tai Yuan. The Germans at headquarters deny having any knowledge of the subject.

PORTS TO BE DESTROYED.

Pekin, April 1.—Regarding the destruction of the forts, the generals are practically agreed that those at Taku, Shan Hai, Kuan and Tien Tsin must at least be rendered useless, while the north fort, at the entrance of the River Taku must be destroyed on account of the fact that ever since it was built it has caused lower water on the bar.

Berlin, April 2.—The Pekin correspondent of the Cologne Gazette says China has agreed to the proposal of the powers to make the Island of Kwang Su, near Amoy, an international settlement model after Shanghai.

YOUNG TITUS HONORED.

Washington, April 2.—The president has appointed Calvin T. Titus, a musician, to be a cadet at the United States Military Academy at West Point. Titus was the first soldier to scale the walls at Pekin. Adjutant-General Corbin cabled Gen. MacArthur at Manila to send young Titus home on the first available transport that he may take the entrance examination to the academy.

PROBLEMATIC.

New York, April 2.—According to the Express, says the London correspondent of the Tribune, 70,000 square miles of territory in the Chinese Provinces of Shan Se and Hoo Nan, rich in iron, coal and petroleum, have been leased to a British syndicate. If there should be any truth in the story the contented attitude of Lord Lansdowne in the face of Russian designs on Manchuria would readily be accounted for.

THE PAN-AMERICAN

Fifteen Thousand Visitors Were on the Grounds Sunday—Good Prospects of the Show Being Opened Promptly on Time.

Buffalo, April 1.—There were 15,000 visitors at the Pan-American grounds yesterday, among them President John G. Milburn and Director of Works Carlton, of the Exposition Company. In reply to a question, Mr. Milburn said: "This weather is full of promise for us. With a continuance of reasonably good weather, the entire exposition will be finished and ready for opening on May 1, with little or nothing remaining to be done."

Mr. Carlton said: "If the weather continues good in April, everything inside the lines of the canal and on the Midway will have a sand-paper finish on it before the opening day. The buildings in the section set apart for the various states and foreign governments will be about all that will not be finished. We are at work already on the roads and open spaces, and on Tuesday we will begin working the men in three sections, so as to work all night, as well as all day, on the asphalt and crushed stone roads."

The work of removing the scaffolding from the electric tower is well under way, and the beauty of that structure was more plainly apparent yesterday than ever before.

Toronto retail milk dealers will have to pay more for their supply in August, September and October. This was decided at a large meeting of the Toronto Milk Producers' Association. Whether the increased price will be maintained after October was left for a future meeting.
