SPED ON A UNICYCLE.

The Sporting Gazette gives the following interesting paragraph about Roy Keator, the unicycle rider:

"Roy Keator, of the Lincoln Cycling Club, is noted the world over as a unicycle rider. He made his reputation on a high wheel, which he rode with the greatest ease standing perfectly erect on the pedals and without a seat on which to sit. Some of his performances bordered on the phenomenal, and caused comment in all the cycling papers. This year he will ride a geared unicycle, the first of this class of machine that was ever ridden. This is a single 30-inch pneumatic-tired wheel, geared to 48. It is the form known as a Mandarin front-driving safety, with only one fork and handle-bars attached. The feat of standing erect on such a mount would be an impossible one for the ordinary rider of to-day, but Keator's past training stood him in good stead, and now he gains quite a turn of speed on the novel contrivance. Thus far he has ridden only inside a building, but soon will be seen on the road and path. He will make an attempt to lower all existing unicycle records, and claims that a mile in 2:40 is possible."

THE L. AND P. S. R. INSPECTION

Cut Short by the Interference of the Lessees.

Engineer Jennings and Ald. Coo Have to Proceed on Foot After Reaching Maitland Street on a Hand-Car—Text of the Correspondence Between Mr. Ivey and the Mayor.

Engineer Jennings, of Toronto, Ald. Coo and four corporation laborers proceeded on a hand-car as far as Maitland street on the London and Southern Railway yesterday afternoon, and they purposed continuing their trip along the London and Port Stanley line, the object of inspecting the road as indicated by the L. and P. S. R. Company, but at Maitland street their explorations were suddenly interrupted. The hand-car had been procured from the Grand Trunk authorities after a request from the mayor had been refused by the L. and P. S. R. lessees. Permission was also refused to the proposed inspection until such request had been put in writing and the lessees relieved of all responsibility in case of accident.

The mayor then sent the following letter:

"To the lessees of the London and Port Stanley Railway:

"On behalf of the Corporation of the City of London I undertake and agree that you will not be responsible for any accident or injury to Mr. Jennings or his hand-car crew in Mr. Jennings' inspection, on behalf of the city, of the London and Port Stanley Railway Line.

(Signed) E. T. ESSERY, Mayor."

When the passengers on the hand-car had reached Maitland street the receipt of the following letter put a sudden stop to their travels in that way:

"To the mayor and council of the city of London:

"Your undertaking of this date on behalf of the Corporation of the City of London, in reference to relieving the lessees of the London and Port Stanley Railway from responsibility in the event of accident or injury to Mr. Jennings or his car crew, is just presented to me for approval. In reply I would say if the document is officially executed by you with the corporate seal attached, I will accept same, but before granting permission to your engineer to go over the road, I will require a request in writing stating what inspection you require to make and how long you will be making it.

(Signed) C. H. IVY, for the lessees."

Determined to proceed with the work of inspection, Mr. Jennings and Ald. Coo proceeded on foot.
