ONE WIFE, TWO HUSBANDS

Astounding Situation Revealed by Tragedy Over \$18 Hat.

Seattle, July 24.—An astounding situation is revealed by the murder of David Thomas, the mortal wounding of the woman known as his wife, by H. C. Lake, who committed suicide after shooting both.

The three occupied a pretty house and apparently lived happily together. It was understood that Lake was a bachelor and that the woman was his sister.

Following the shooting, the woman stated that when she refused to allow Thomas to purchase a \$18 hat for her because it cost so much, Lake up-braided Thomas for not getting it anyway, and the shooting followed.

Investigation by the authorities disclosed that the woman was Lake's wife. The couple formerly lived in British Columbia, where Thomas appeared and ran away with Mrs. Lake. Lake followed the couple to Seattle and went to live with them, although allowing his wife to be known as the wife of Thomas.

CIRCUS TRUST COMING

Positively the Most Stupendous, Unrivalled Aggregation Ever Seen.

New York, July 24.—The circus folk are getting up a trust. Barnum & Bailey's circus, Buffalo Bill's Wild West, and the Forepaugh & Sells circuses are to form the nucleus of the combination, which is to be under the control of the Barnum & Bailey company. Under Mr. Bailey, of the Barnum & Bailey combination, is not in this country, but he is expected in a short time, and it is believed that the combination will be formed without trouble.

The object of the arrangement is to divide the United States, England and Germany up between the three shows, so that each will be able to devote two years to each of these countries, and there will be no opposition.

PAID MAY YOHE!

Strong Family Settled With the Actress—Gets Her Jewels and Cash.

New York, July 23.—Wherever Putnam Bradley Strong may be, he is now safe from arising on the charge of grand larceny made against him on Monday by May Yohe, as the Strong family settled that woman's claims against him yesterday.

A sum of money said to be between \$15,000 and \$20,000 was paid to Miss Yohe and her lawyer yesterday afternoon in the office of Job E. Hedden, for two years private secretary to Mayor Strong and for many years the legal representative of the family, and in pursuance of her agreement Miss Yohe and her lawyer went at once to police headquarters, where they told Captain Titus, of the detective bureau, that they no longer wanted Strong arrested. Captain Titus dropped the case in haste.

Friends of Strong believe that he has gone back to Japan. Yesterday Miss Yohe sent a cablegram to the man with whom she pawned a good many of her jewels in Yokohama last year, saying that she would be in that city just as soon as the next steamer would bring her there. Emanuel Friend, the woman's lawyer, emphatically stated that there was no arrangement for Strong and Miss Yohe to meet again at the other side of the world.

GUILLOTINE MAY GO

French Senate Threatens to Stop Capital Punishment.

Paris, July 24.—The guillotine seems to be doomed. A war of words now waging in the senate threatens to extirpate capital punishment, and with it France's grim and blood-stained instrument of public vengeance.

The crisis was brought on by the case of a man named Bidaux, condemned by the courts to death. Formerly the place of execution was La Roquette, near Pere la Chaise, but that has been voted too public, for it is considered that such exhibitions have no salutary effect upon the morals of the people. The prisoner is confined in La Sante, and it was suggested that the execution take place within the prison walls, but La Sante is by no means anxious for this distinction. Hence the matter was referred to the senate, and the Chamber of Deputies. Several senators have demanded to know why there should be capital punishment at all, if it must be so carefully concealed. The argument for and against has grown so strong that the recapitulation of Bidaux promises to be indefinitely postponed.

SMASHUP AT DUNDAS

Rear-End Collision of Freights—Considerable Damage Done.

Dundas, Ont., July 24.—A rear-end collision occurred yesterday morning, on the Grand Trunk Railway, about one hundred yards west of the station. The caboose and two freight cars were thrown off the track, and the engine of the second train was partially smashed, but did not leave the track. Traffic was delayed until about 10 o'clock in the morning.

That an accident of this kind should occur here seems peculiar, as the block system is in use between Copetown and Hamilton, and under this system a train could not leave Hamilton until the former had left Dundas.

It is said the engineer of the second train ran past the semaphore, which was set against him at the western limits of the yards.

109 DROWNED!

Death List of the Elbe Disaster Is Growing Longer.

Hamburg, July 23.—It is announced that 109 persons were drowned by the sinking, Monday morning, of the steamship Primus, of this port, after a collision in the River Elbe with the tug Hansa, of the Hamburg-American Line.

AN OPEN VERDICT.

New York, July 24.—The jury in the Latimer case yesterday brought in a verdict declaring that Latimer was killed by a pistol shot wound. No accusation against anyone was made by it.

Suicide of J. E. Rush.

Windsor, Ont., July 23.—News has been received that John E. Rush, 23 years old, son of Postmaster Rush, of Essex, has committed suicide by hanging at Briscoe, B. C. Young Rush's mind has become deranged. It is said, by a disappointment in love. Rush went west about four years ago.

Low Water in Gulf of Mexico.

Washington, July 24.—Lieut. Foster, in charge of the New Orleans branch of the United States hydrographic office, has reported that a recent survey of the Gulf of Mexico, of the mouth of the Mississippi River shows only 25 fathoms of water, where there was 60 fathoms at the time of the previous survey. Lieut. Foster is puzzled over the phenomenon. Many believe it was caused by the recent earthquakes in the West Indies.

Getting Well of Lockjaw.

New York, July 24.—Treated by a recently discovered process, Joseph Tiernan, the 11-year-old son of Michael Tiernan, formerly a member of the New York baseball team, is believed to be recovering from lockjaw at the Harlem Hospital. Antitoxin in small doses is being injected into the spinal cord, between the second and third vertebrae of the lumbar region. Previously antitoxin had been injected into the brains through a small hole bored in the skull.

AFTER FASTING 62 DAYS POLICE CHIEF MURDERED

Mrs. George at Last Succumbs to Starvation.

Cancer of the Stomach Was the Cause—Most Pitiful Case.

Chesterfield, Ind., July 24.—After a fight with death for sixty-two days, during which no morsel of food passed her lips, Mrs. Amanda M. George on Monday succumbed to starvation. At the age of seventy-eight, with a vitality which was a puzzle to doctors and laity alike, she had for three months apparently set the grim destroyer at defiance.

Mrs. George's fast was neither for sensation nor on prescription of her doctors. It was compulsory, and the absolutely decline of her appetite till finally no liquid but water could be swallowed was, according to her physicians, caused by a cancer that gradually ate her life away.

Mrs. George was a spiritualistic medium and regarded as one of the best in the state. For years at her home on Massachusetts street in Indianapolis, she had gone into trances and revealed secrets, past, present and future, for visitors. An intense believer in the return of the spirits of the dead, she had passed each summer in the Spiritualist Camp, and this season had again been invited by the Indiana Association of Spiritualists to her cottage in May and was shortly joined by her daughter, Mrs. Ella Phipps, of Chicago. Mrs. George's condition, however, was so severe from stomach trouble, and refrained from food for a few days, hoping thereby to correct it. Instead of recovering, every attempt to feed her caused the same agony, and the old lady tried soft diet, only to find that this, too, seemed beyond the possibility of her digestion. When she consulted the doctor she was told that cancer of the stomach was her trouble, and she bravely resigned herself to slow death by starvation.

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MADE CHILD DRUNK.

Montreal, July 24.—Sarah Jane Huston, five years of age, lies at the General Hospital in a critical condition, suffering from alcoholic poisoning, the result of whisky given to her by her parents when they were both drunk.

DEAF MUTE KILLED.

Deseronto, Ont., July 23.—John Earl, a deaf mute, aged about 35, was accidentally killed by a Bay of Quinte train near Deseronto Junction this morning. Earl came from Brockville, to which place his remains will be sent this afternoon.

THE CHILDREN PERISH.

Baltimore, July 23.—A gasoline stove exploded at Pinto, Md., today in the house of W. M. Peck and his wife. The house was consumed and two children, six and four years of age, were burned to death. Mrs. Peck barely escaped with her life, and her young baby was seriously burned.

FOUR TEACHERS MURDERED.

Washington, July 24.—The war department received the following cablegram regarding school teachers who have been missing from Cebu since June 10: "John E. Wells, 209 Montgomery avenue, Providence, R. I., and his cousin, Louis A. Thomas, same address; Ernest Hager, 1413 Vine street, Cincinnati, Ohio; Clyde A. France, Berca, Ohio, missing; Cebu, murdered by Ladrones; bodies recovered. Leader of murderers killed; eight others captured by the constabulary."

Smallpox Down East.

Toronto, July 23.—Smallpox has reappeared in South Antigonish, N. S., after eight years. Two cases are reported, and the doctor in charge says one case is as bad as any he has seen. The cases are traced to an outside source.

RIVAL ELECTRIC LINES

Two Companies Want to Build From Windsor to Leamington.

Windsor, July 24.—Two electric lines are projected from Windsor to Leamington, a distance of about 35 miles, and there is a big fight on between the rival companies to place their lines. The necessary franchises in the terminal points and through the several intervening townships.

The Windsor, Leamington and Lake Shore Company was first in the field with a proposal for a line to run between Windsor and Leamington via Essex and Kingsville. At the same time, a company was given a franchise, and claims also to have franchises all along the route, from the station of Leamington and the adjoining township of Mersea.

A few nights ago when representatives of the company appeared before the Leamington council they bumped up against the rival company, which was also seeking a franchise. Promoter Nelson, of the original company, flashed a telegram from Engineer Newman, of Windsor, to the effect that the contract for the work had been signed, and the road to be completed next year.

But the council did not put through the franchise, and the company is declared to stand the better show of winning out.

Date Has Been Decided Upon and Great Time Is Assured.

She had sent one of her boarders, Aniel Maur, to a drug store, to buy some roachelle salts and he bought the poison, but, it is understood, by mistake. After taking it, she became violently ill and died in great agony. Maur immediately disappeared.

Sailors Do Work of Birds.

New York, July 24.—Failure of the Janius ludovicianus, commonly known as the shrike bird, to put in its appearance this year and rid Bronx Park of caterpillars preying upon the foliage, led the park commissioners to send to City Island for all the able-bodied men who wanted a job. About 400 men responded. Climbing trees was simple as trimming sails to them, and the fruits of their first day's work delighted the park commissioners, who say they no longer fear the destruction of foliage.

All are in excellent health and spirits. Lieut. Evans is in command, and Major Merritt second in command. The men all speak well of the officers.

Lieut. Carruthers, of Kingston, the hero of Hart's River, has little or nothing to say, and expresses wonder at the fuss the Canadian newspapers have made over his little exploit. Capt. A. F. Ashmead and Surgeon Lieut. Lorne were most cordially welcomed by hundreds of friends and admirers from Quebec. Surgeon Lieut. Lorne was attached to the Canadian hospital at Klerksdorp, South Africa.

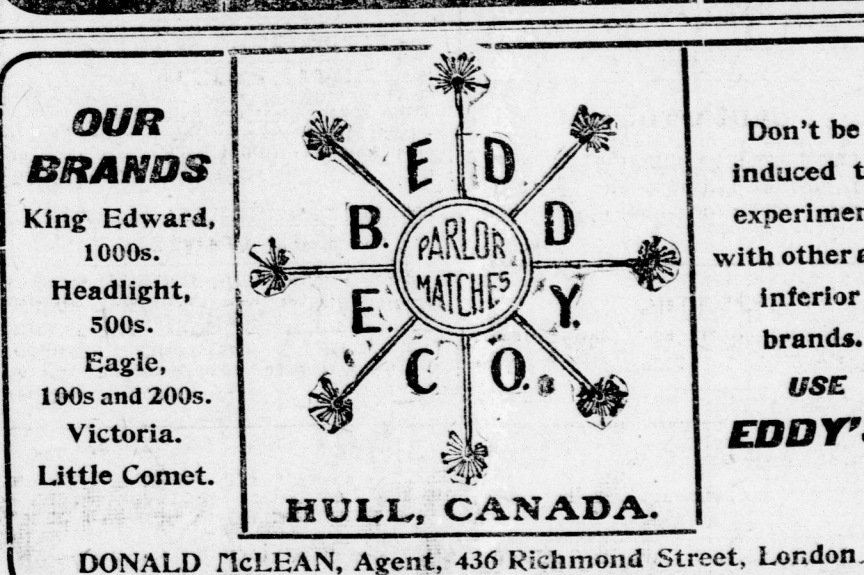
