### Rojestvensky or Togo?

Trustworthy dispatches from the Far East now show that Rojestvensky, first reported, is moving in a northeast. in mind hit-and-get-away operations while he has, by uniting his fleet, provided against defeat in detail, defeat in chances of his ships eluding the

Meanwhile, the whereabouts of Togo reported that he had made a base of Kelung, on the south coast of Formosa. This would be an admirable point at which to await the enemy, as it commands the two northern channels of exit from the South China Sea, the straits between Luzon and Formosa likely to succeed. on the one side and the mainland of China on the other. There is nothing, however, to show that Togo will choose to fight here. He may prefer to rush to Vladivostock ahead of the enemy. If he elects to fight off the coast of Formosa within a day or two, we will have news of the battle through crippled ships entering neutral ports. If Vladivostock be the point at which the fleets are to clash, it will be several follows: weeks before there is a battle.

It has frequently been pointed out that the Russians, in tonnage, greatly outweigh the Japanese. On the other hand, it is generally admitted that the Mikado's ships can outsteam and outmaneuver the Russians. However, there is luck to reckon with, and although, by many experts considered improbable, it is quite possible that Rojestvensky may pull off a victory.

Lord Nelson fought with 27 ships against the allies' larger fleet of 33 ships. Togo is expected to have some 40 vessels against a possible 50 under Rojestvensky.

As at Trafalgar, so now in the Far East, the stake for which the two great fleets will struggle is the command of the sea. It is Russla's last hope of redeeming her lost prestige, while Japan risks not only her sea power, but the fruits of their victories by land. Both as to the actual conflict and the issues at stake, everything points to the greatest naval battle of modern times one that promises to be


