APPROACH RAILWAY

Some Individuals Wanted to Negotiate With the C. P. R.

Montreal, Aug. 31.—A special meeting of the strike-breakers and some of the men was held today at the Commercial Hotel, near the Angus shops, as a result of the move made by some of the men to approach the company's workers at the Angus shops and the union officials.

Some dissatisfaction regarding strike pay was said by the men themselves to be the cause of a further defection from the ranks of the C. P. R. strikers today, when a dozen of the regular metal workers at the Angus shops made application for positions. Up to noon a total of 52 applications were made at Angus shops, and nearly all were engaged. They were said to have some experience.

Trouble regarding strike pay has become more acute. Most of the men live in the same section of the city, and the grocers and butchers have been refusing any further credit to them and their families.

WINDSOR IS A

NEGRO ASYLUM

Refugees from Springfield Seek Safety in Border Town From Reign of Terror.

Windsor, Sept. 1.—George Jesse, a negro from Springfield, Ill., arrived in Windsor this week and intends to make this his future home. He came here in the role of a refugee, being forced to flee by the fear of being included in the wholesale attack on the colored people of Springfield.

Having heard that it was a privilege to live in Windsor, this was the first place he made tracks for when he left the scene of the riots. He describes the sight in the negro quarters of Springfield as being awful to behold. The colored people, he says, were afraid to stir from their homes, and a veritable reign of terror held sway for the space of four or five days. Jesse, who is a widower and about 50 years of age, took no chance, but fled the town at the first opportunity. He says that the life of no colored man was safe, and he never knew but what he would be the next sacrifice to the insatiable thirst of the mob. He never wants to return to the south, but will try to find work in Windsor.

Chas. Robinson, colored was found sleeping in an outhouse Friday evening, and was locked up. He gave his age as eighteen and his occupation as a cook, and said that he came to Detroit from Springfield, Ill., only a week ago. The magistrate thought he had been having enough trouble if he had been in the Springfield race riots, so Robinson was let go with a warning.

TO CUT OFF BABE'S HEAD

Surgeons Hope to Save Life of Two-Headed Child.

New Orleans, Sept. 1.—An operation in which many local surgeons are interested will be performed within the next few days on a New Orleans child which was recently born with two heads. The second head is not perfectly formed, but the top of it is well covered with a healthy growth of hair. Mr. and Mrs. John B. Murray, the parents of the child, consented to an operation when their physician informed them that this was all that would save the baby's life, and the second head will be removed.

Surgeons at the children's annex to the Charity Hospital say that the birth of a two-headed baby is not uncommon, but the fact that the Murray child has already lived 11 days with its two heads is, they believe, an incident never recorded before, a double-headed child usually dying soon after birth.

McGUIGAN'S ENGINEERS

Smith, Kerry and Chase to Put up the Transmission Lines.

Toronto, Aug. 31.—Messrs. Smith, Kerry & Chase, of this city, of which Mr. Cecil B. Smith is the head, are to have charge of the construction of the transmission line for the McGuigan Company, and are ready to proceed with the work as soon as the contract is signed.

A BIG SHORTAGE.

Havana, Sept. 1.—A shortage of upwards of \$10,000 has been discovered in the bureau of supplies and vouchers in the general postoffice, of which Senor Rodriguez is chief. Rodriguez has not been seen in Havana since Friday, and secret service police have been searching for him, but without success. Rodriguez held the same post as Charles F. Neely who was convicted of extensive frauds during the first American intervention.

The officials say, so far as they know, there is nothing in the story that Swift and the Cayuga operator were working together and intended tying up the road and getting out with the money at the same time, although the Cayuga man did leave the service about the same time as Swift.

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CATTLE EMBARGO

HITS CANADA HARD

Loss to Dominion From British Restriction Estimated at \$30,000,000.

Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 31.—Canada has lost probably more than \$30,000,000 by the operation of the British embargo against the export of live cattle from this side of the Atlantic. That loss is still going on at the rate of \$10 per head on cattle exported from this country to Great Britain. This is the opinion expressed with much force and positiveness by W. Henderson, J. P., a member of the Perthshire county council and of the Scottish chamber of agriculture, who is visiting in this city.

The embargo question is now before the Imperial Government, open and unsettled. The Government is an avowed free trade Government, Henderson declares, committed to the most favorable possible treatment of the colonies consistent with that policy, and if a policy of such weight as the British agricultural commission, now touring Canada, should report that cattle disease is absolute non-existent in Canada, as the Canadian authorities emphatically contend, and that there is no danger of its introduction into Britain, it would be almost impossible for the Imperial authorities to longer hold out.

What the British Government needs, he says, is sufficient pressure from Canada to offset that of the Irish cattle breeders, who, at present, have the absolute monopoly of entrance to the English market, and are anxious to maintain it.

The consequence of the embargo is to compel Canadian live stock shippers to deliver their cattle at one port in Scotland and two, or at most, three ports in England, for the reason that the other permitted ports are of no importance in the cattle trade. It is, in consequence, an easy matter for a ring to control the buying of cattle in these ports.

It is denied that the English or Scotch farmer, who gets the live cattle into shape for the local market, would obtain an undue proportion of the gains from the increased value of the cattle, or that it would tend to the shipping from Canada of cattle in an unfinished condition. The reason why they are not fit for the high-grade market, when they land in Britain, if they had to be slaughtered at once, is because of the immense loss of weight during transit.

It is pointed out that Britain exported to Canada last year 61,783 horses, which is the biggest export ever known, although the total value of \$6,200,000 was exceeded in 1906.

FIVE MONTHS IN PLASTER

Baby With Double Pre-Natal Dislocation Made Perfect.

Chester, Sept. 1.—Mary Lascomb, 3 years old, after undergoing one of the most remarkable operations ever performed in this country, will be discharged from the Crozer Hospital in a few days. The child was discovered nearly a year ago by a local physician, who ascertained that she was suffering with a double congenital dislocation of the hip joints, a serious pre-natal condition, from which no child has ever recovered thoroughly by other than surgical treatment, and this in many instances has failed, until the famous bloodless method, as demonstrated by Lorenz, became known.

The case of Mary Lascomb was placed in the hands of Dr. D. P. Maddux, who called into consultation Dr. Herbert L. Northrop, dean of the Hahnemann Medical College, Philadelphia, and it was decided to adopt the Lorenz method.

The hips and legs were placed in position and kept in a plaster cast for five months, the cast being removed from time to time. Now Mary is able to romp along the concrete floors of the hospital corridors, having been transformed from a hopeless cripple into an active child.

ROMANS USED SHORTHAND

British Museum Has Dictionary of System Invented by Cicero.

London, Sept. 1.—The British Museum has just come into possession of a lexicon of shorthand, the invention of which is attributed to M. Tullius Tiro, a freedman of Cicero.

"Cicero's" Dictionary of Cyphers," is the description on the Latin title page of the volume, which is of the tenth century. The museum experts have not yet had time to make an examination of the book. It is, however, regarded as a prize of great value, likely to yield much interesting information with regard to the system of Tullius Tiro, who may be rightly regarded as the first of shorthand clerks.

The book is simply a dictionary of shorthand signs, with their equivalents in Latin words, arranged in three parallel columns to the page. The shorthand characters are drawn in a labored style, and in many instances it would appear quicker to write the Latin words for which they stand.

In shape and general appearance, however, they have a remarkable resemblance to the shorthand systems of the present day. No alphabet is given, and there is no apparent demonstration of a system. All the characters represent either full words or prefixes.
