C. P. R. WILL NOT OBJECT TO ADELAIDE ST. LINE

Nature of Crossing Is in the

Hands of the Railway

Commission.

The special street railway committee

did not meet on Tuesday night

owing to the fact that City Solicitor

Meredith was unable to be present. A

five-minute session was held at four

o'clock, when Mr. Meredith reported

progress, and explained that the

agreement and bylaw would be ready

by Tuesday next, when a meeting will

be held to consider it.

It is expected that the C. P. R. will

not object to the city's request for a

crossing over their tracks at Adelaide

street. It is not likely, however, that

the company will join the city in requesting

a level crossing. Their attitude will be merely non-resistant. The

question of the nature of the crossing is

in the hands of the railway commission.

It is expected among the aldermen

that a subway will be ordered. There

was a deputation of the residents of

Cheapside and neighboring streets, to ask that the north end

extension run along Victoria not

behead streets. Among them were

Mr. E. T. Essery, K. C. J. P. McMan-

combe, Mr. Lester and Mr. Nicholson.

However, as there was no meeting, the

deputation were sent to Ald. Blandford

chairman of the committee.

SCHOOL GROUNDS ARE THROWN OPEN

Board of Education Is Willing to Assist in Playgrounds Movement.

GRANT WAS DEFERRED

Dr. Curtis Addressed the Trustees and Explained the Scheme From All Standpoints.

At a special meeting of the board of education held on Tuesday afternoon

to discuss the playgrounds movement, it was decided to call another special

meeting for that purpose.

A deputation from the association, composed of Sheriff Cameron, Mrs. F. P. Betts, Mrs. H. E. White, Mr. W. J. Hill, Rev. T. H. Mitchell and Dr. Curtis

was present to explain the matter thoroughly to the trustees.

Dr. Curtis declared that it was the desire of the association to equip half

a dozen playgrounds throughout the city. One of these would be a school yard, and the association thought the

board could take the equipment of this centre off the hands of the association.

Grant Not Named.

Trustee W. T. Strong then moved that the board open the school grounds to the association, and that a grant

sufficient to purchase the necessary equipment be set aside for the purpose.

"I strike out the request for \$1,000," explained Mr. Strong, because I think it would be better not to name any amount. Whatever is necessary I think the board are willing to set aside."

There was considerable discussion as to making a grant. It was pointed out by Trustee Gammon that there was no money in the estimates for this purpose, and the whole question had better be referred to the board.

"I am in sympathy with the whole movement," declared Trustee Hunt. "At the same time, I object to equipping one school ground. If we do one of them all the children all over the city are entitled to consideration, and the movement will fall short of being a success unless we reach them all. I would be in favor of spending less money on each playground, but equip them all."

Open Up the Grounds.

After some discussion it was decided to drop the question of making a grant to the association, but it was agreed to open the school grounds and give moral support to the movement.

"If the board will open the grounds and give us their active support we will be satisfied," said Mr. Inkster. "I am fully aware that there is difficulty in the way of making a grant, and we would agree to defer that until a special meeting of the board thoroughly discussed that phase of the question. However, we need your support. We need your assistance."

To give the board agreed, and a committee composed of Trustees W. T. Strong, A. M. Hunt, and Rev. J. Gibson Inkster was appointed to confer with the association, and lend whatever assistance possible.

Those present at the meeting were Messrs. John M. Gunn, chairman, M. F. Irwin, E. R. Dennis, A. M. Hunt, W. T. Strong, W. W. Gammon and Secretary McEhleran.
